"Eyer's DITCHING MACHINE.-This ma chine was put to trial on Tuesday, in Mr. Leslie's nursery, in the presence of a con siderable number of spectators, and gave universal satisfaction. It continued working for two hours, and in that time dug a drain The construction of the machine is exceed ngly ingenious. First of all, there is a frame. like the bottom of a waggon, about ten fee in length, mounted on four wheels of small each side, to which are attached two teams of horses. On the hinder part of the frame the workman stands who regulates the working of the machine, which he does by means of two handles very much like those of a plough. These handles are constructed with wheel, eight feet in diameter and eight sioned, and that after a suitable recess, you for the murder of Stephen Neubecker, was inches broad, of great weight, which descends through a hole about three feet from one front of the frame. This wheel is where he working power is situated. Its rim is furnished with a series of spikes so placed that when it turns round—the spikes being forced into the ground by its own weightinclined funnel, through which it passes out to the edge of the chain.
