ONTARIO POULTRY ASSOCIATION.

The above association, under the patronage of the Honorable William P. Howland, C.B., Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, will hold their fourth Exhibition of Poultry and Pigeons in the Agricultural Hall, Toronto, on Wednesday and Thursday, April 21 and 22, 1869.

No. 1. Exhibitors are requested to examine the Prize List and Rules, and particularly to notice that they will not be required to come with their specimens, which will be penned and fed by the Society, and returned by any way desired immediately after the exhibition.

No. 11. No alteration can be made in the prices of the specimens during the Exhibition, and no person who has the management of sales cannot charge any of his specimens disposed of privately.

No. 12. The certificates of entry may be had on application to the Secretary, if by post, by addressing a stamped and directed envelope.

No. 13. Each pen of birds, consisting of one cock and one hen, must be packed in a separate box or hamper (carriage paid), with full directions securely and prominently fixed on the top—proper direction labels will be supplied by the Secretary, and the reverse side must have the exhibitor's name and address written thereon, for the return journey.

No. 14. The entries close on Wednesday, 31st March, nor can any alterations be made after they are received by the Secretary.

No. 15. Exhibitors must be at the Agricultural Hall (corner of Queen and Yonge Streets, Toronto), by Tuesday, the 20th day of April, not later than 1 o'clock, P.M.; they will also be received during Monday.

No. 16. Members of the Ontario Poultry Association, and Exhibitors and donors of \$5, will receive tickets, non-transferable, for admission during the Show.
