SHAVING HEADS A CURE FOR DRUNKENNESS. -In the Isle of Guernsey the crime for drunkenness is greatly on the increase. At a meeting of the Court of Chief Pleas last week, a proposition was made that every person convicted for the third time of the offence of drunkenness should have all the hair shaved off his or her head. EXTRAORDINARY LANDSLIP AT WIGAN. On Thursday ofternoon, about four o'clock, a landslip occurred in a yard at the top of the Wiend, Wigan, occupied by Mr. Saw-bridge, butcher. A cow was standing near some outhouses, distant not many yards from the public street, when suddenly the ground opened beneath the affrighted animal, which sprang several yards just in time to escape a fall down a chasm which was instantly form ed. A man in the yard saw the occurrence, and threw some stones into the opening to ascertain the depth, which appeared to be not less than six or seven yards. Within a few feet of the surface the width of the opening seemed to be about three yards by two. Many years ago a colliery was worked near this spot, and either the shaft or some of the old workings have doubtless fallen in. The slip bared the foundations of the outhouses, which yesterday, about noon, fell into the hole, the depth of which has thus been much reduced.


