APPEAL TO THE BENEVOLENT.

SIR,-Now that the season of immigration is fairly upon us, and thousands of stalwart Europeans and laborers and others, many with capital, landing on our shores, it be-hoves us to be up and doing to make provision for those people who are a source of great wealth to this growing country. The Governments, both Local and Dominion, are

doing their duty handsomely; but there is more than this wanting. Every man in the country has an interest in this great move ment, and it is all important that the heads of municipalities, both in towns and country, will assist the Government and the Immigration Agents in their operations. A cordial welcome, a kind word to those people on their arrival, has an immense influence to reconcile the newly arrived immigrant to his new land of adoption. However, this is not all that is required. Parties requiring the help of those laborers in their different municipalities will require to exert themsel ves to find immediate employment for those people; and not only that, but to assist in conveying them to their various destinations, after the Government have forwarded them by rail to the nearest point from which applications have been made by the various municipalities in more remote sections of the country. Where hands are so much required, complaints have been heard on all sides for years past, that immigration has not received the attention it should have done; but, of late, the Government of Ontario has come out handsomely in getting up the most val-uable information in pamphlet form, which is now being widely circulated through Europe by their agents on the spot. 
As soon as it was considered advisable this child was removed with his mother to the Hospital, where he died a short time afterwards.


