TWO ATTEMPTS TO BREAK GAOL .- Leary, the Jack Sheppard of the Toronto Gaol, made an unsuccessful attempt to break from that institution on Sunday night last. It will be remembered that he escaped twice from the charge of the police while being conveyed to trial. On this occasion his love of liberty appears to have been as strong as ever, but his mode of securing his object was different. Leary is confined in the north west wing of the gaol, the same por tion of the building from which Ulric the United States forger and his partner made ther, escape two years ago, Leary was equally successful in breaking his cell, having removed a bar in the grated door and thus squeezed himself through into the corridor. The night watch failed to notice any change in the appearance of the cell after Leary's removal but looking as usual into the water-closet, found the burglar concealed there. It was evidently his intention had he not been caught, to attempt the removal of the grating from the outer window and thus lower himself iuto the freedom of the outer world.

Monday night another prisoner, named William Bryce, awaiting trial for larceny, attempted to escape in precisely the same man ner. A bar was removed from his cell door, but without attracting the attention of the watch. He was subsequently found in the water-closet, a locality that had become more interesting to the watch from the discovery of Leary there on the preceding night. Bryce had very ingeniously laid his water piggin on his pillow, and his bolster lengthwise on the bed to represent himself. The illusion was perfect, and quite successful until the original was found in the water closet. Leary, the first-named of the wouldbe jail-breakers, has an illustrious prison record. Though not more than 25 he has spent five years in the penitentiary, has been several times tried for robbery and larceny, and committed several thefts while supposed to be in prison awaiting trial. 
