POISONED UCISERY. Numerous instances of disease results ing from the wear of 'fancy' socks have been reported lately. An Illinois gentleman came near dying a few days since from a disease of this character. Some months since, Dr. Tardieu, of Paris, presented before the Academy of Medicine the history of several cases which came under his observation, and which eases at first were also incorrectly diagnosed erysipelas, &c. By means of hypadermie injections they introduced under the skin of dogs, rabbits. and frogs very minute portions of corraline. The results were that the animals died in from two to four days. This is certainly a matter deserving attention.
