"OTTAWA, 24th Nov., 1869. MY DEAR SIR,-

"We shall have to make a heavy payment to you on 1st January for subsidies, &c., &c., in all, I believe, over \$500,000. May I ask if you are going to place this sum on special deposit at interest? If so it would e a matter of convenience that you would errange with the bank that you will deposit with it to take the amount on the 1st Decemer instead of the 1st January and allow us the month's interest. You will, I am sure, be of opinion that we should accommodate each other as much as possible. We have as much on interest as the Bank of Montreal will take, and it would be desirable to get even a month's interest at 31 or 4 per cent., which I have no doubt any of the banks would allow. Please telegraph me, if you think the arrangement can be carried out, 'Arrangement practicable,' or if not, 'Arrangement impossible.'
