There is also an increase in both the In come and Personal Property; but in Real estate there is a considerable falling off, except in East Gwillimbury, Markham and York. In the former there is an increase of \$131,903, and \$21,706 and \$10,287 in the others. The rest of the Townships show a decrease. In Etobicoke, of \$12,340; Georgina, \$133,550; North Gwillimbury, \$35,143; Kin2, \$36,485; Scarboro', \$88,538; Vanghan, \$2,506; and Whitchurch. \$15,604.
