PAPER MAINTENANCE IN ENGLAND.

Every body knows in a general way that the cost of maintaining the English press has been increasing greatly of late years but few, we suspect, are aware of the extent of that increase.

THE NATIONAL DEBT OF ENGLAND AT THE CLOSE OF THE LAST YEAR.

The national debt of England at the close of the last year was £276,183, and since then the sum of £2,000,000 has been converted into a temporary annuity. The debt is now less than it has been since 1813.

THE AVERAGE NUMBER OF PERSONS LIVING IN A SINGLE HOUSE IN LONDON.

In Paris 35, in St. Petersburg 52, and in Vienna 55. The average proportion of illegitimate to legitimate births in London is 1 per cent; in Berlin 16 per cent; in Paris 20 per cent; in St. Petersburg 26 per cent; and in Vienna 51 per cent.
