SPIRITED SKIRMISH .-- THE PRUSSIAN ARMY. CAUSE OF DELAY .- SERVICES OF LEE AND BEAUREGARD DECLINED.

LONDON. Aug. 3.- The following details of the affair at Saarbruck have been received. The fight begun at eleven o'clock yesterday forenoon. The French passed the frontier in force. The Prussians were driven from their strong position by the sharp artillery fire of the French. The latter remained masters of the position which they won without serious loss.

It is admitted by the French that their hesitancy has sacrified their advantage. The following is given to day as the numbers and disposition of the Prussian Army: The Duke of Mecklenburg commands 108. 000 men at the mouth of the Oder. At the mouth of the Elbe, General Falkenstein has 58,000 men; near Ems General Herwarth de Bittenfield commands 50,000 men. The army of the Rhine consits of the foliow ing bodies: 80,000 men at Cologne, under General Steinmetz; 18.000 at the Junction of the Main with the Rhine, under Prince Frederick Charles; and 16,600 along the Upper Rhine, under the Prince Royal Frederick William. The chiefs of staffs are Generals Moltke, Blumenthal, Sporting and

Berlin 3, via London. - The following official despatch is published yesterday. A small detachment stationed at Saarbruck was attacked by three French divisions. After a sharp action the position was abandoned the Prussians falling back on their supports. The loss is trifling.

The following is official: a reconnaissance was made yesterday by a body of the Baden light horse and Prussian Huzzars. The force engaged a French scouting party near Star gerbrunn. One officer was killed and several wounded on the French side. Two Prussians were slightly wounded.
