Frightful Railway Accident.

Boston, Mass. August 26.—A frightful accident occurred on the East Railway to night, at Revere, seven miles from Boston. The accommodation train started behind time, and while stopping at the station in Winthrop the Portland lightening express overtook and telescoped it, killing twenty-five passengers outright, and wounding some forty or more. The cars took fire, and two or three were consumed. Most of the wounded are scalded, and their limbs fractured. A large number of physicians and surgeons were in attendance. The facts seem to be as follows:—The fifteen minutes past seven passenger accommodation for Beverley under charge of conductor Nason, was delayed half an hour beyond the time of its departure by the non-arrival of inward trains. Not deeming it expedient to remain longer, Nason started his train with one baggage and four passenger cars at half-past seven o'clock, and made usual stoppages until he came to Revere station. There s train was brought to a halt. He started on then, and for some reason not yet understood it was halted again. Suddenly be heard a cry of danger and looking back he beheld a bright light coming round the curve, scarcely half a mile from the station. The agony of the moment can be much better imagined than described. Loungers about the station, and they were but few in number, recruited from those passengers who were unhart, hurried to the spot and lent their ready aid in the amelio-ration of the sufferings which were occa-One after another of the bodies of the dead were taken from the ruins-21 in number—and laid side by side in the wait ing room of the station. They presented a sickening sight. Not one was there whose face or body was not scalded, almost be-yond possible recognition, and their blood stained their garments, and the bubbling forth which lay upon their lips betokened too well the agony which they had suffered. There were but three women in number, and their dress indicated that they belonged to the middle walks of life. Their faces were distorted beyond power of description. Among the men there was one whose right

Among the men't destitute of flesh, and whose limbs were gashed to the bone.

Chars also appeared equally as severely mutilated. As they lay in the station, it was painful to witness the eager and anxious faces of those who sought through the remnants of mankind, in search of some beloved relative or friend. Up to one a.m. there had been no one identified. The wounded were removed to houses near by, and those who could bear the journey were taken to the Chelsen Marine Hospital, three miles distant. Their injuries are for the most part a severe but not dangerous character.

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
