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York County Council.

From the City Gazette. The Council resumed at ten o'clock Thursday—the Warden in the chair. The Council again resolved itself into a committee of the whole, Mr. Rose in the chair, on the report of the special committee appointed to discuss and report on Mr. Shields's claim for the loss of a horse.

The Warden thought that to pay the claim would be to establish a bad precedent in bringing every one who happened to drive into a ditch or over a bank, to the Council for damages. He thought it would be better for the Council to stand a law suit, in order to see whether the case might be settled at once. He would suggest that the matter be referred to the commissioners on county property.

Mr. Jones did not think it would be advisable to incur the expenses of a law suit; he thought it would be better to pay the claim. After some further discussion, Mr. Jones moved that the proposition of Mr. Shields, offering to accept \$100 for his loss, be accepted, and that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the same. This motion was lost.

The Committee then rose, reported progress, and asked leave to sit again. It was being now the Council adjourned. The Council resumed at a quarter to four o'clock, the Warden in the chair. The Council again went into committee of the whole, on the report of the committee on county property, Mr. Eakin in the chair.

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
