This large volume of business, secured in so short a time will very nearly equal that of any company transacting business in the Dominion, though many of them have been working here upwards of twenty vears.

Such truly striking results, achieved by a purely Canadian association, in the face of keen popposition and expenditure of the foreign companies, affords the strongest proof that could be shown of the necessity of the establishment of such a home irstituion as this, which must command the confidence of the Canadian public, by giving insurance on the most advantageous terms and affording every guaranty for safety and for its economical management.
