Tragedy at Orillia.

Port Dalhousie has lost by the death of Mr. Jonathan Woodall, in his 81st year, one of its oldest, most respected, and best known citizens.

Mr. Woodall was employed on the canal from the breaking of the first sod in 1824, up to within a short period of his death. For many years he attended Lock I, and when his health failed he was appointed Light-house Keeper, being succeeded in the office by his son. For many years Mr. Woodall has suffered from hemiplegia, but his death was rather unexpected, as but a few moments before breathing his last, he had been conversing with some friends. There is but one man now living who has been as long on the Welland Canal as an employee as the deceased.—St. Catharines Journal.

A YEAR AGO.—A story reached us yesterday of the death bed confession of a man who, about a year ago, pretended that he woke up one morning and found his wife dead by his side. The man is reported to have been very steady in his habits, and no word reaches us of any disagreements with his wife, but after a year of agony he confessed to a woman who was with him in his last hours, that she smothered his wife, and that ever since she had haunted him—her face being continually before his eyes, reproaching him for the murder. He expressed himself as willing and even anxious to die to escape the misery he endured. Our own recollection of the case is that the corner's jury returned a verdict of death from heat of passion on the testimony of her husband, but the judge, on post mortem examination, made the urging of two physicians to the contrary notwithstanding.
