An Ingenious Dredging Machine.

A powerful new iron twin screw dredger A powerful new iron twin screw dredger built and engined by Messrs. W. Simons & Co., was recently launched from the London Works, Renfrew. Wintering Various Bules and Tubers

This class of plants deserve some care for, aside from their beauty, they can very readily be wintered without the constant atverbenas, geraniums, and other soft-wooded

kept, although we confess the past very dry seasons have not been very favorable to a fine show of this, otherwise, fine autumnal stage of a cool greenhouse, they will have as cool a situation as they need. If kept in a cellar, they may be put in boxes or barrels with quite dry sand mixed between them.

If the roots are exposed, the cellar will sometimes be too moist, when they may rot, while if too dry, without the sand covering there is danger of the tubers skrivelling. It may not be generally known that the very beautiful blue Salvia patena has a root similar in shape to the Dahlia, and may be

kept in substantially the same way. The very tropical looking Calocassia, now coming. into pretty general use for planting out in the centre of ornamental groups of foliage plants in the summer, has so fleshy a base as to almost form a bulb, may be kept quite readily in a common warm cellar, if surrounded by dry sand. The Erythrinas have a large, hard, woody root, and may be kept readily the same way. The flowers are pea-like in shape, quite large, and of a scarlet or bright red color, very sin-

gular and very beautiful. This plant farther outh, assumes the form of quite a shrub or small tree, in the summer. The Canna is another plant under this head that must not be forgotten. A group of these noble foliaged plants, placed on the lawn in. front of the dwelling, is always an attractive feature.
