#### VAUGHAN TOWNSHIP ELECTION.

#### HON. M. C. CAMERON'S OPINION.—POLLS MUST BE OPEN D. AND THE RIGHTS OF ELECTORS MAINTAINED.

We are now in a position to prove to our readers, particularly those interested in the good government of the Township of Vaughan, that the announcement made in these columns last week is fully sustained by no less an authority than that of the Hon. Matthew C. Cameron. In so far as we are concerned, we had implicit confidence in the opinion of our correspondent, "Sentinel," and had no hesitation in making known to the electors of the Township of Vaughan that the proceedings of the Township Clerk, in declaring the members of the old Council re-elected by acclamation, were contrary to the Municipal Law. We regret, for the sake of the electors,—Reeve, Deputies, and Clerk—that such an exposure of incapacity should have to be made; but our duty to the public required that we should not permit such a flagrant violation of the Municipal Law—and thereby an injury to the Township—to pass by unnoticed. We gave warning in time, that the blunder or trick (?) might be repaired, and the electors have their rights maintained. If a council is illegally declared elected, the necessary consequence follows that all its acts are illegal—resulting in confusion and loss—and authority usurped by a pack of incapables, whose acts cannot be sustained, if elected.

An order that the electors of Vaughan may fully understand the situation, as it is, we submit the opinion of the Hon. M. C. Cameron for their information:

"In the Municipal election, I have no doubt that the clerk of the council acted illegally in declaring the old council elected. The candidates proposed in the first poll should have taken place or not. It is not necessary to do a second poll as is done from sec. 21, ch. 20, of 31 Vic. Stat., which strikes out the words 'and a second poll is demanded' from section 11 of the Municipal Act of 1866."

Reeves; we hope that all the new candidates proposed will be elected, in order that fresh blood will be introduced into our Municipal Council: for the old set do not appear to understand their business; or if they do, they are all the more to blame for knowing and not doing their duty. To the pollsters, and send them to the right about."

#### MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

On Monday next, the 6th inst., the taxpayers in Ontario are expected to return representatives to the various Township Councils. As we are more particularly interested in the Townships of Vaughan and Markham, we purpose to draw the attention of the ratepayers of these two Townships to a matter that has been for years a source of annoyance to every farmer residing in the East and West Ridings of York. As a reason why the ratepayers should not vote for Messrs. Ashton, Boyle, Cane, Eakin, Jacks, J. H. Lane, McNeil, Phillips, Porter, Randall, Reed, Robinson, Severn, Webster, and Wickson, we would state as a fact, and in proof of our assertion, refer our readers to the minutes of the County Council of February, 1872, pages 8, 12, 43, and 45,—whereby it will be seen that the above mentioned gentlemen voted "no" on a motion to adopt the report of the Special Committee of three, (Messrs. Wheeler, Duncan and Ball) appointed to confer with the Corporation of the City of Toronto, or Market Committee, on the expediency of repealing or otherwise changing the existing regulation in reference to the sale of hay, straw, and fodder, or devise some means more satisfactory to the vendors of the same. As all farmers who attend the hay market in Toronto can fully understand the great inconvenience and expense farmers are unnecessarily put to in Toronto, by the present hay market regulations, and as they will readily see that the select committee reported in favor of relieving farmers of these annoyances, it becomes the duty of every farmer and well regulated mind to record their votes against those gentlemen for having voted against the interests of their constituents in the County Council on that occasion. We ask the electors to read 20 minutes we refer to, and then vote.

#### MEETING AT YORKVILLE.

It will be remembered that during the last sitting of the Ontario Parliament, a charter was obtained by certain gentlemen in Yorkville for the purpose of forming a company under the heading of the "Yorkville Water Works Co." Finding that they had an "elephant" in their hands the said gentlemen induced the Reeve of Yorkville to call a public meeting of the ratepayers to see if some arrangement could be made to relieve the company of the scheme. At said meeting a committee was appointed to take the matter into serious consideration—that was in the month of April last. Well, after eight months of labor on the part of the at least who were active members of the committee; they have conceived and brought forth the "able report" as appears in the Globe of the 20th ult., a 3rd which at a meeting held in the village on the evening of the 19th, after two hours of debate was carried out, but ordered back for further information.

The narrow views expounded in reference to the City of Toronto, by certain gentlemen leads one to think that the one-man power enjoyed for such a length of time is—by some at least—fearful of being curtailed. If the company, as some of the speakers assert have merely got the good of the village in their eyes, why do they not go on with their works, and not ask the corporation to relieve them of their responsibility. In any case providing the corporation do take stock in this company the proviso should be made that no member of the company should have a seat at the Council Board. This we think is sound Gri doctrine.—COMMUNICATED.
