Ball in Honor of Earl Dufferin.

MONTREAL, Jan. 8.—His Excellency the Governor General and the Countess of Dufferin having graciously expressed their willingness to leave to the Ball Committee the selection of any day within the period prescribed for their stay in this city after their return from Quebec, the committee, in pursuance of the resolutions of the Queen's Hall, Cathedral Block, to have the place in readiness within a specified time the best of its completion, necessarily involving large outlay on the part of that committee. This is not the first instance in which the committee have deferred to the wishes of the religious community at large. To the hall itself a select number of the committee conversant with building matters were present to examine and assure themselves of its perfect security.

A Paris tradesman has been sent to prison for two years for displaying in his shop placards containing remarks insulting to the National Assembly.

On Wednesday two school Trustees are to be elected the gentlemen retiring are Messrs. Severn and Wickson, our present Reeve and Deputy Reeve. It is said they will not offer for re-election, having come to the knowledge that the double responsibility is too great, and contrary to the principles of Reform, to represent the people in "two houses."

The next meeting of the British Medical Association will be held in London. An open air meeting was held in Stockton on the 15th ult. in favor of Fenian amnesty, at which 12,000 persons were present. The English and the Welsh outnumbered the Irishmen, charged on the platforms, carried off the Irish flags and trampled them in the mud.
