

York County Council.
The County Council met Wednesday, the 28th inst., at 10 o'clock, the Warden in the chair.
Communications were received from Messrs. Harrison, Ouler & Moss, dated Feb. 3, notifying the Council that the Court of Common Pleas had rendered judgment in favor of the defendants in the case of County of York v. City of Toronto, it having been held that Clause 403 of the Municipal Institution Act was not sufficiently explicit to enable a county to recover against a city for the use of the Court House for judicial purposes.
From the Lady Managers of the Girls' Home, thanking the Council for their liberality in voting \$100 towards the support of the Home last year, and praying for continuation of the grant.
From the Board of Trustees for High School District No. 3, in the County of York, enclosing their report from which it appeared that the number of pupils entered on the registry during the year was 43, the average attendance being 224, which is an increase of two on the average attendance of the previous year.
The by-law for granting the sum of \$475 to the Electoral Division Agricultural Societies, the money to be apportioned on the same basis as last year, was read a second time in Committee.
The committee appointed to investigate the claims of Mr. John Montgomery brought up their report, which recommended the Council to petition the Legislature of Ontario to have the said claim properly investigated by a Committee of that House. Mr. Montgomery appearing to have been most unjustly dealt with.
The report was adopted.
On motion of Mr. Mansie, the Council went into Committee of the Whole, for the purpose of considering the report of the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges. The report recommended that the petition of Newman Silverthorne, asking the privilege of connecting his fence with the road fence at the south side of Dundas street, and connecting with Etobicoke bridge, be granted. The Standing Committee considered no good reason had been shown why the Council should appoint a commissioner for the purpose of obtaining plans and estimates for bridges at the River Etobicoke, and did not therefore recommend such appointment. With reference to the petition of J. W. Gamble, William Wallace, Wm. Wakefield, G. W. G. Whitney and five hundred others, praying that the control of the company roads should be assumed by the Council, the committee reported that Mr. Beuhne, acting solicitor for the companies, not in possession of sufficient data to place before them to enable the Standing Committee to come to an intelligent conclusion, and it was therefore advised that the matter be allowed to stand over till the June meeting of the Council. With reference to the petition of Thomas Jackson, requesting the Council to open the original road allowance at the town line between the townships of York and Vaughan, at the second concession, the committee reported that the Standing Committee were of opinion that a straight line drawn between the stone monuments at said town line, planted at the front and rear of the second concession of the township of Vaughan, will mark the true northern boundary of the original road allowance of the aforesaid town line between the townships of York and Vaughan, and suggested that the Clerk of the Corporation be instructed to give the necessary eight days' notice to enable the Council to pass a by-law at its June session to open said town line in accordance with these views.
Mr. Boyle, seconded by Mr. Porter, moved in amendment to the fourth clause, that the same be struck out and the following inserted in lieu thereof: "That your Committee are of opinion that the road as now travelled is the true original road allowance, and recommend that no further action be taken in the matter." Lost on the following division: Yeas—Boyle, Cane, Porter, Reed, Speight, Wheeler, Webster—7; Nays—Clarke, Canning, Duncan, Jones, Law, Leslie, Macklin, Milliken, Munroe, McDonald, Phillips, J. D., Randall, Stephenson, Tyrrell and Watson—15.
The report as given above was then adopted.
Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Macklin, moved that a special Committee composed of Messrs. Tyrrell, Randall, Porter, J. D. Phillips and the mover, be appointed to enquire into the management of the several High Schools for the purpose of learning, if any of the youth taught, or if incidental expenses are charged to the High School Districts which should be paid by the Parents and School Sections, and that said committee report to the Council at its June meeting.
Mr. Porter moved that the Warden be instructed to communicate with the Chief Superintendent of Education to learn the correct interpretation of the School Law with regard to the formation by County Council of High School Districts.—Carried.
Mr. Reid introduced a by-law for the appointment of assessors for the County of York to act in conjunction with the Chairman of the Court of General Sessions of the Peace Messrs. John P. Wheeler and Nelson Graham were duly elected, and the by-law was carried.
Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Marratt, moved that the resignation of the Clerk of the Council be accepted, but not to take effect till the next June meeting of the Council.—Carried.
The Council then adjourned till 10 a.m. Thursday.
The Council met on Thursday morning at the usual hour, the Warden in the chair.
The report of the Standing Committee on equalization, which was adopted, stated that the assessment rolls of the several municipalities had been examined and found to be correct.
On motion of Mr. Stephenson, a select committee consisting of Messrs. Jackson, Munroe, Wheeler, Tyrrell, Eakin, Cane, the Warden, and the mover, was appointed to wait on the Governor in Council to press the claims of the County Council for a share of the surplus funds about to be divided among the several municipalities of the Province.
The by-law for granting aid to the Electoral Division Agricultural Societies was read a third time, and amended to read: "That the total amount granted not exceed \$175, to be apportioned as follows: West Riding Society, \$125; East Riding, \$125; and North Riding, \$150."
A by-law introduced by Mr. P. Phillips for the appointment of a new clerk in place of Mr. Elliott, resigned, was read a third time.
The Council adjourned till Friday.
The Council met on Friday morning at 10 o'clock, the Warden in the chair.
Mr. Tyrrell moved the second and third reading of the petition to the Local Legislature in respect to the 82nd section of the Municipal Law. The motion was carried and the petition was read a second time. It set forth that the provisions of the said section referred to were most unjust to young men who were unassessed, in compelling them to do two days' statute labor; while those who were assessed in small amounts had but to perform one or one and a half day's labor, and prayed for the Legislature to authorize the County Council to act in the matter.

The following gentlemen were named as Trustees:
No. 1 High School Board—Messrs. Wm. Nelson, Dr. Bell, B. Wadsworth, James Carson, James Crichtonbank and Allan Gray.
No. 2 High School Board—Messrs. James Speight, John Gibson, John Crawford, Rev. James Carmichael, Jones and Henry Durcan.
No. 3 High School Board—Messrs. John Lane, Wm. Patterson, J. P. Wells, James McNair, N. C. Wallace and Rev. James Dick.
No. 4 High School Board—Rev. S. F. Ramsay, Messrs. Freney, Slow, Speranza, Nelson Gorham, John J. Stokes and Dr. John Bentley.
The Contingent Committee brought up their report to amend by-law 102, recommending that the payment of Jurors be increased from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per day. The report was adopted.
The Committee on Finance and Assessment reported that the Yearly Comptroller had had under consideration the following documents, communication from the Treasurer, together with detailed statement and voucher for four quarterly accounts of the past year, and statements of the non-resident Land Fund and High School accounts, with abstracts showing the assets and liabilities of the County.
Petition of Dr. Bell and other constables, praying your council to supply each constable with a badge of office.
Accounts of Messrs. Harrison, Ouler & Moss, amounting to \$8.25.
Bills from Messrs. Wadsworth & Unwin, in connection with the incorporation of Richmond Hill, amounting to \$41.
Bills from Messrs. Blake, Kerr & Bethune for \$89.
Communication from Dr. Roseburgh, asking aid for the Toronto Jail Mission Sunday School.
The petition of the Lady Managers of the Royal Home, asking for aid; also from the Managers of the Magdalen Asylum or Female House of Refuge, asking for aid. The Report also embodies communications of minor importance.
The Committee desiring to state that they find the accounts of the Treasurer in a very satisfactory state, showing both ability and care in performing the duties of his office, and that they find the financial affairs of the county to be in a very healthy and prosperous condition. Your Committee have also made enquiry as to the salaries of the Treasurer and find them to be satisfactory.
The committee recommended the payment of the following salaries: Messrs. Harrison, Ouler & Moss, \$8.25; Blake, Kerr & Bethune, \$89.
In referring to the aid applied for by the following institutions: The Boys' Home, the Girls' Home, the Magdalen Hospital, and the Burnside Lyng in Hospital, the House of Providence, and Toronto Jail Mission Sunday School, the Committee believe them to be useful institutions, but in view of the increasing demand of the poor inside the county, they cannot recommend your council to continue granting aid to those institutions outside the county.
The Committee recommended that a one-horse pedlar's license be granted to Wm. Poynton, Daniel Pezer, and Wm. Andrews. They also do not recommend the Council to dispense with the tax on dogs. They recommend the Council to increase the Jurors allowance from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per day.
With a view of the increased labor of the County Treasurer, they recommended that the salary be increased, but the Committee, however, are not prepared to report in favor of an increase at the present time.
Mr. Tyrrell moved that the report be not adopted, but that it be amended by giving the grants to charitable societies as formerly.
Mr. E. Jackson, seconded by Mr. Mansie, moved the original question, whereupon a division was had. Yeas—Cane, Clarke, Eakin, Jones, Jackson, Law, Lane, Macklin, Milliken, Munroe, Murrat, McDonald, Mosier, J. P. Phillips, Porter, Randall, Reid, Speight, Stephenson and Wheeler; total, 21. Nays—Duncan, Leslie, Severn, Tyrrell and Watson—total, 5.
The report was adopted.
The Council then adjourned until the 16th of June, 1873.
King Amadeus abdicated the throne of Spain on Tuesday last, and explained his reasons therefor in a message which his Majesty sent to the Government. He distinctly laid all hope of reigning in peace, because he found so many persons continuing intriguing against him. He says that if foreigners had done so he could have borne with the annoyance, but when he found Spaniards engaged in creating a disturbance continually in the country he resolved to abdicate and leave the country. At the conclusion of the reading of the message, Senator Rivers, President of the Senate, the Cortes of Spain was then called to the chair, and upon motion of a deputy, the Burtes resolved upon establishing a Republic by an overwhelming majority.
