FALL OR SPRING WHEAT .- There are parts of North America, principally confined to the great corn growing belt, where the culture of winter wheat, in consequence of the loss from freezing and other case alities, has been discontinued. In thise districts the principal dependance is neces sarily upon the spring varieties; and where care is taken in the selection of seed, and in the preparation for the crop with carty seed ing, a quality of spring wheat is produced that will yield flour of very high grade, and that is actually richer in the essentials of bread food than winter wheat. But whenever winter varieties can be grown to advantage, they are found to be more satisfactory, owing to their better yield, earlier ripening, and superior average quality. While the superior merit in regard to quality is possessed by winter wheat, it is useless to advocate its custure in places for which, from climate or other causes, it is unsuited

HOW TO HAVE EARLY STRAWBERRIES .-After all it costs so little to have early strawberries it is strange more do not have them than generally do. Of course, to have them very early it would be necessary to grow them a few months in pets, but many persons might have them without this trouble by simply covering the ground in which they grow with a few hot bed sash. It is remarkable that country gardeners do not make more use of glass frames for get ting things earlier than they do. Glass i cheap, and the eash frames are not very costly. One can glaze for himself, and the frames can be made good enough for the purpose on any farm. They come into use in so many ways that every farm garden ought to have a lew of these sashes on hand. For strawberries, all that is necessary is to have a bed growing on some nice warm spot of ground, and then set one of these frames over them. It takes very little heat to bring forth strawb rry b ossoms, and the glass covering protects them from frost and cold at night A trame five feet wide and twen ty feet long, fixed in this way, would give many quarts of strawberries for several weeks before the regular crops come in the
