The developments of the Pacific Railway scandal continue to be the topic of by the people of our village during the conversation in political circles. Cartier in the published letter of the 24th of August last, was an arrangement personal to himself and Sir Hugh Allan, independent of either of them; and that at the earliest possible moment the whole of the facts and circumstances will be laid before a tribunal competent to receive evidence respecting them under oath."
