THE PUBLIC MEETING AND THE HIGH SCHOOL TAX.

The ratepayers of Richmond Hill held a public meeting on Monday last, and discussed the difficulty which has arisen in regard to the debt for building the High School House. We publish the proceedings in another column. It will be seen that the ratepayers decided to take legal advice; and if the law is against them, they will come to time without more ado. The Council appointed the Reeve and Mr. David Hopkins to prepare written questions to be submitted to the law firm of Harrison, Osler & Moss, and to obtain from these gentlemen a written opinion upon the points of law relating to the present position of the High School Board of Trustees here; and their power to compel the Village Council to collect the balance of the debt (\$1170) on the building from the ratepayers of the Village of Richmond Hill. It is admitted on all sides that the Council has made a selection that cannot fail to give satisfaction. We trust they will give the matter immediate attention, and relieve the ratepayers from suspense. We have already heard the opinions of two eminent law firms upon the important point in question—one from Blake, Kerr and Boyd, on behalf of the County Council; the other from Hon. M. C. Cameron, on behalf of the Board of School Trustees; both opinions agreeing as to the liability of the village. But it is expected that our Reeve and Councillor Hopkins will shed a new light upon the whole question, and triumphantly bring our village safely through the financial ordeal through which it is now passing,—owing to the demands of our Board of School Trustees. If we must pay the debt, the sooner we know it the better; for this reason we insist upon Messrs. Law and Hopkins giving the subject their immediate attention.

PROROGATION OF PARLIAMENT.

The adjourned Parliament met at Ottawa, on Wednesday last—the looked for 13th of August. As we hoped for, His Excellency has been guided by His constitutional advisers—Sir John Macdonald's ministry—and has prorogued Parliament. In the speech from the Throne, His Excellency, referring to the Pacific Railway enquiry, makes use of the following language:—

"I have thought it expedient, in the interests of good Government, to order that a Commission should be issued to inquire into certain matters connected with the Canadian Pacific Railway, to which the public attention has been directed, and that the evidence adduced before such Commission should be taken on oath. The Commissioners shall be instructed to proceed with the inquiry with all diligence, and to transmit their report as well to the Speakers of the Senate and House of Commons, as to myself. Immediately on the receipt of the report I shall cause Parliament to be summoned for the despatch of business, to give you an early opportunity of taking such report into consideration."

AS IT SHOULD BE.

We understand that the public banquet to be given by the friends of the Hon. Mr. Gibbs, is to come off on the 28th instant. It is also said that a public dinner will be given to the Right Hon. Sir John Macdonald, at Ottawa.—This is as it should be, and our friends, the Grits, know how to do the spreads well; they feel that it has a good effect on their "Parity," of which their opponents might take a lesson. We think, more especially at the present time, that it would not be out of place for the friends of the Ottawa Government, residing in the Queen city of the West, Toronto, to invite them to a public dinner in that city, to come off say next month, and put the tickets at such a rate that all classes could enjoy the feast of reason and good things. Surely parties could be found who would take an interest in it so as to make the affair a success. What say you good friends of the city, will you make the move?

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

We have before us the report of the Superintendent of the above Bank, for the five years ending 30th June last, from which we purpose giving some extracts, showing the prosperity of this department of the public service:

Number of Post Office Savings Banks at close of period, 239; number of deposits received during period, 44,413; total amount of Deposits received during period, \$8,974,418; total expenses of management, \$15,093,78; average cost of each transaction, viz., of each deposit or withdrawal, 0.22; number of accounts opened during period, 48,663; number of accounts closed during period, 25,137; interest allowed to depositors, \$398,104, 28; total amount standing to the credit of all open accounts, inclusive of interest allowed, at close of period, \$3,207,051.57.

PUBLIC MEETING.

Richmond Hill, August 11, 1873.
Pursuant to notice, a public meeting of the ratepayers of the village of Richmond Hill was this day held in the Court Room, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of deciding how the debt remaining due on the new Brick High School House shall be provided—whether by assessment this present year, or by an issue of debentures creating a debt payable with interest.

Mr. Wm. Harrison was called to the chair, and M. Teffy was requested to act as Secretary.
The chairman explained the object of the meeting.

It was moved by D. C. O'Brien, and seconded by M. McNair, that the debt of the High School of this district shall not be paid by the ratepayers of this Municipality.

In amendment moved by Wm. Trench, seconded by Thomas Wilson, that this meeting hereby authorize the village council to obtain good legal advice in regard to the legality of the demand made by the Board of Trustees for the levy on this Municipality of the debt due on the High School Building.

The amendment was then put to the meeting, and the vote was, yeas 26, against the amendment 21.
The chairman declared the amendment carried.

It was moved by Mr. Barnard, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that this meeting be adjourned until after the Council shall have obtained legal advice.—Carried.

The chairman then declared the meeting adjourned.

VILLAGE COUNCIL.

SPECIAL MEETING.

August 11, 1873.

Pursuant to a resolution of this Council passed at a Special meeting on the 2nd August instant, a Special meeting of the Council was held this day, at two o'clock, p.m. to meet a committee of the Council of the Township of Markham, with a view to have all matters of difference between the two corporations adjusted.

The Reeve in the Chair.
Councillors present: Messrs Brillinger, Hopkins, and Warren.
The minutes of the 2nd August were read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Brillinger, that the Clerk of this Municipality be and is hereby instructed to communicate with the Clerk of the Township of Markham, requesting him to inform this Council when it would be convenient for the committee appointed by the Markham Council to arrange matters as to the assets and liabilities between the two Municipalities—to meet with this Council for the purpose of adjusting the same.—Carried.

REGULAR MEETING.

Aug. 11, 1873, 7:30 p.m.

Pursuant to adjournment on the 14th July, the Council met this evening for general business. Present—The Reeve, Councillors Brillinger, Hopkins, Powell, and Warren.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.
The following accounts were passed, and ordered to be paid:

Mr Isaac Crosby, for Nails ...\$26 75

Mr Gibson and Assistants, for survey..... 36 60

The Clerk read a communication from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Board of School Trustees, dated 9th August, requesting the Village Council to provide the sum of \$16.08 (sixteen dollars and eight cents) as the village portion of \$500 required for the current expenses of the High School for the present year.

Moved by Mr. Brillinger, seconded by Mr. Warren, that the Reeve and Mr. Hopkins be a committee to take legal advice of Messrs Harrison, Osler & Moss on the High School question, in writing—in accordance with a vote of the ratepayers at a public meeting held this day.—Carried.

The Council then adjourned to meet in the Court Room on Monday the 25th August at 7:30 p.m.

Editor's Notes.

The Central Exhibition will be held at Guelph, on the 16th, 17th, 18th, and 19th of September next.

The first passenger and freight train of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway arrived at Owen Sound from Toronto on Saturday last. The Superintendent, Chief Engineer, and a large number of passengers were on board; also a considerable quantity of freight.

PRESENTATION.—The committee who had the management of the Band Concert held on Dominion day last, presented Miss Velie with a very beautiful silver card basket, for which this young lady returned her sincere thanks. This small token of appreciation was given on account of the kindness of Miss Velie in lending her Piano on that occasion.

MARKHAM COUNCIL.

The above council met at Size's hotel, Unionville, on the 26th ult. Members all present. Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Petitions were presented:

By Mr Lane, from Wm. Mustard and others, for grant to make a ditch in front of Lot 31, 5th Con.

By Mr Milliken, from Jos. Graham and others, for grant to cut down the hill on 7th Con., in front of Lots 6 and 7.

By Mr Button, from A. Grove and others, for a grant of \$20 to clean the ditches in front of Lots 33 and 34, in the 7th Con.

The Reeve laid on the table the report of P. S. Gibson, P.L.S., of survey of 9th Con., with affidavits.

Mr Lane, seconded by Mr Marsh, moved that the sum of \$5.25 be and is hereby granted to Hugh Gardener, to repay him for money expended for the support of a foundling child; said sum payable to the order of the mover.

Mr Milliken, seconded by Mr Marsh, moved that the sum of \$10 be granted for making two culverts on the towline between Markham and Scarborough, opposite the 10th Con., to meet an equal grant made by the Scarborough Council; said sum payable on the order of Joseph Lapp.

Mr Lane, seconded by Mr Marsh, moved that the Clerk procure one dozen copies of the Consolidated Tavern and Shop License Act for the use of the Council and License Inspectors of this Township.

Mr Button, seconded by Mr Marsh, moved that the sum of \$19 be granted to complete the contract on the side line between Lots 30 and 31, in the 8th Con.; payable to the order of John Ramer, N. Button, Francis Pike and J. R. Hoover.

Mr Lane, seconded by Mr Marsh, moved that the name of Michael Cross be substituted for that of Joseph Cox, for Commissioner for making the road across Lot No 5, in the 3rd Con., (Jos. Cox having left the Township), and that the commissioners be requested to proceed forthwith to improve and open out the sidewalk.

Mr Marsh, seconded by Mr Button, moved that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to procure six copies of the Municipal Manual for the use of this corporation.

Mr Milliken, seconded by Mr. Button, moved that Messrs Eakin, Lane and Marsh be and are hereby appointed a committee to arrange with the incorporated villages of Richmond Hill and Markham Village, as to the liabilities and assets between those municipalities and this township, and that the Clerk notify the Clerks of those municipalities of the passing of this resolution.

Mr Lane, seconded by Mr Milliken, moved that the account of John Pike, for plank and labor for culverts, amounting to \$11.75, be paid to the Reeve by the Treasurer.

Mr Milliken, seconded by Mr Lane, moved that Messrs Button and Marsh be and are hereby appointed a committee to inspect the road in front of Lots 30 and 31, in the 5th Con., and report at the next meeting of this Council.

Mr Marsh, seconded by Mr Lane, moved that Mr Milliken be and is hereby instructed to inquire into the situation of Robt. Anthony, a pauper receiving help from this Council, and report at the next meeting of this Council and that the resolution passed by this Council, granting aid to the said Robt. Anthony, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Mr Lane, seconded by Mr Milliken, moved that the grant made to Christopher Crozier cease from and after this day, and that the Clerk notify James Robinson, Esq., of the passage of this resolution, and Mr Button is hereby appointed to inquire into the character and circumstances of the said Christopher Crozier.

Mr Milliken, seconded by Mr Button, moved that Messrs Lane and Marsh be and are hereby appointed a committee to inspect the drains put across the sidewalk between Lots 10 and 11, in 10th Con., by Wm. M. Button, Esq., and report to this Council as to the value received by this township from the said drains.

Mr Lane, seconded by Mr Milliken, moved that the account of P. S. Gibson, Esq., P.L.S., amounting to \$7.50 and also the account of Charles LeLeivre, Esq., amounting to \$13.75 be paid by the Treasurer.

The Council then adjourned until Saturday, the 30th day of August.

The Kingston raid against the unlicensed liquor sellers has fallen through, in consequence of the defective nature of the Crooks' bill. It is pronounced to be as big a humbug as Pardee's registration bill.

The Norwood Register learns that as a train was nearing Blairton one day last week, a carload of Nitrate of Soda caught fire, caused by a spark from the engine; the soda was nearly all destroyed, as what was not burned was strewn along the track approaching the village. Unfortunately a number of cattle grazing in the vicinity picked up the soda, and in consequence died in a short time after.
