THE SCANDAL MONGERS.

We are very much afraid our readers will think we are taking too much notice of the articles on the "Pacific Scandal" that have appeared lately in the sheet published in the village of Markham...

In last week's paper it commences its article with a reference to white washing and white wash brushes, evidently having in its mind's eye, the whitewashing McKellar received from the Ontario Assembly, in the matter of the "Proton" outrage.

The writer finds fault with the enquiry being submitted to a commission, yet with the same pen he writes that twenty-five or thirty members of Parliament owe their seats to the money paid for the Pacific Railway contract.

In the Economist of 24th July, the following candid confession occurs:—"So far we have evidence that cannot be controverted, because we have the telegrams, the bank books, and the letters. This evidence covers forty thousand dollars paid over in about two days."

The object of that meeting was to have a full expression of opinion from the ratepayers, as to what they wished to have done in regard to the High School Building.

On reference to the minutes of the proceedings of the Village Council at the regular meeting held on Monday last, the 1st Sept., which will be found in another column, it will be seen that the Council unanimously resolved to resist payment of the High School debt. They have done this without consulting their constituents, and in the face of legal opinion. We think the Council has been premature in taking so decided a stand, before submitting the legal opinion to the ratepayers, as was decided at the public meeting by motion for adjournment, moved by Mr. Barnard and seconded by Mr. Wilson.

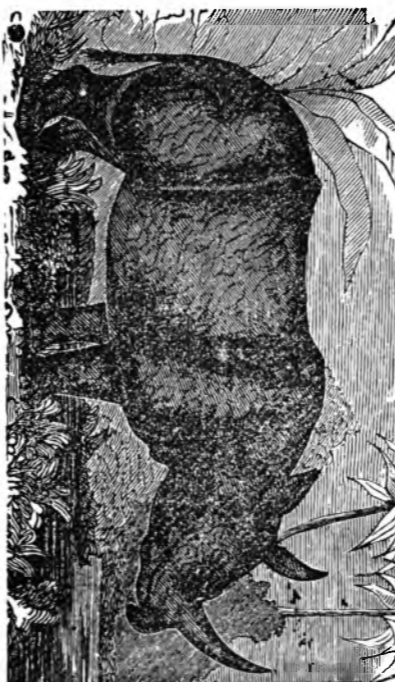
