

**SAD YACHTING ACCIDENT.**

It is our melancholy duty this morning to record one of the most sad and distressing boat accidents which have ever occurred on Lake Ontario, resulting, as it did, in the death, by drowning, of three of our young and most promising citizens, and the miraculous rescue of the fourth, after two days and three nights of intense suffering, from exposure to the cold and inclement weather of the past few days, and from starvation. The particulars of the said affair are as follows:—On Friday afternoon the yacht *Sphinx*, owned by Mr. Henry Davidson, of this city, started for Hamilton, to take part in the regatta which took place here on Saturday. She had a crew of five gentlemen, and three boys. Mr. T. K. Morgan, barrister of the firm of Morgan and Thorn; Mr. T. D. Groves, son of the Rev. Mr. Groves of Brockton; Mr. Henry Davidson, of the firm of Russell & Davidson, jewellers; and Mr. John Ward, son of Mr. Ward, jeweller, of Adelaide street. All went well with the craft until about nine o'clock in the evening, when off Port Colborne the boat struck by the squall, which swept over this neighborhood. The boat was capsized and the crew precipitated into the water. All four succeeded in getting on to the bottom of the boat, to which they clung throughout that night without seeing any hope of rescue, and drifting before the wind across the lake towards the southern shore. About nine o'clock on Sunday morning Mr. Moran, who had become exhausted by exposure and hunger left his hold and was immediately buried beneath the waves. Half an hour afterwards Mr. Groves also left his hold to rise no more. Soon afterwards the yacht righted, and the survivors scrambled into the hull, the most of which had been washed away. Davidson and the boy remained on the wreck, floating about the lake all Sunday night. Early in the morning Ward, who was sitting at the stern of the boat, fell asleep from exhaustion, and on awaking was horrified to find the dead body of Mr. Davidson by his side. Fortunately for Mr. Ward a means of rescue was close at hand, for just at this time the barque *Mary Battle* (Capt. Sullivan) came along and saving the apparently deserted craft, hove to and rescued the only survivor from a watery grave. The corpse of poor Davidson with Ward, who was in a senseless condition, were taken on board and conveyed to Port Dalhousie. An inquest was held yesterday at Port Dalhousie on the body of Mr. Davidson, and a verdict in accordance with the above facts returned. The body will be brought to this city this morning, and Mr. Ward the survivor of the ill-fated crew will also arrive here this morning. The sad accident has cast a gloom over the whole city, the unfortunate gentlemen who have met such an untimely death, having been extensively known and highly respected. The bodies of Messrs. Morgan and Groves had not been recovered up to last evening.—*Leader of Tuesday.*

**OBITUARY.**

**DIED.**—On the 4th inst., of typhoid fever, at his father's residence, Whitchurch, Charles Steel, aged 23 years. He was a young man of an exceedingly amiable disposition, and earnest piety, and much beloved by all his acquaintances. During the past year he had attended the High School here, in view of preparing himself to enter on probation for the Wesleyan Ministry. He was also a zealous adherent of the Temperance cause, and seemed to be ever ready for any good work of which he was capable. Young men will do well to follow his steps. The Rev. J. Hunt preached a funeral sermon last Sabbath in the neighborhood where he died, and also in the Wesleyan church here in the evening of the same day.

**Mrs. JAMES HALL.**—It is our regretful duty to chronicle the demise of our old neighbor Mrs. James Hall, which event took place at the village of Bleinheim, county of Kent, on Wednesday the 19th inst. Mrs. Hall was very much respected by the inhabitants of our village (in which she lived for upwards of twenty-three years) for her kindly manners and charitable works, and will be mourned for by many acquaintances. Her husband, Mr. James Hall, formerly shoe dealer in this village, some few years ago, purchased some property in the village of Bleinheim, which necessitated the removal of the family to that place where they have resided for three years past.

**DEATH OF Mr. Wm. ROWELL.**—It is our melancholy duty to record the death of our esteemed friend, Mr. Wm. Rowell, who died at his residence, in Yorkville, on Sunday evening last, about 8 o'clock, after an illness of over three months. Although only unable to rise from his bed, since Wednesday before the day of his death, all that doctors and his friends could do for him was done. Mr. Rowell had been residing in Yorkville for about forty years, having come there when a boy of about nine years old. He at one time filled the position of Reeve, and at the last election for the Commons, was returning officer for the East Riding of York. He was a sterling friend and a man of sound judgment. His funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon last, and his remains were followed to the grave by numerous friends. His widow and family have our deep sympathy in their sad bereavement. His end was peace.—*Com.*
