OUR VILLAGE TAXES, BEFORE AND SINCE INCORPORATION

During the discussion of the High School Building difficulty, which is now, criticise them too severely. we are happy to say, satisfactorily and meet poration.

As there are more persons assessed for \$200 than for any other particular sum on the assessment roll, and as they are less able to pay heavy rates of taxes than their more fortunate neighbors, owning thousands, we purpose comparing the rates levied for village purposes this year with the rates of 1872, before the village was set apart as a distinct Municipality. For the purpose of our illustration, we will confine ourselves to that part of the village west of Yonge Street. The rates in the Township of Vaughan, last year, in so far as they relate to Kichmoud Hill were as follows :--

For County......22 cents in the \$100. " Township..... 10½ "
' Com. Schoots. 30½ "

" High School .... 9 " Statute Labor ... 75 per day.

But as the rate for High School Building is included in the above, we will confine our remarks to the ordinary tax. that is to say, County rate, Local rate, Common School rate, High School maintenance and Statute labor-and for these purposes a village ratepayer asses sed last year for \$200 (before the vil-I g was incorporated, be it remembered) was as follows :--
