FIRE AT STAYNER .- News from Colling wood of Tuesday last announce that on that morning a fire broke out in Mr George Randolph's saw mills at Stayner, which has proved one of the most disastrous that has occurred in the vicinity for many years.

The fire is supposed to have been caused by
the explosion of a kerosene lamp used by the night watchman. The oil was spilled among some shavings and the whole was The Council examined into the claims ablaze in a fe v moments. The fire spread of John Severn, John Purtil, Joseph rapidly to the lumber yard and adjoined made to ext nguish it. There were about 4,000,000 feet of lumber in the yard, a large portion of which were first quality. The railway station, freight house and telegraph office, were also destroyed, although most of the freight was saved together with the books belonging to the company and the telegraph offices. There were 10,000 bush els of wheat in the storeroom principally owned by Messrs Laidlaw and Long Bros. which was all barned. Summerte'dt's brick hotel was also burned, and the private resi dences of Messis Phillips, Nicol and some others. It is impossible to get full par ticulars to day, but the loss is supposed to be not less than \$75.000. The insurance is not known. A special train was despatched from Collingwood about six o'clock this a.m. with our steam fire engine and fire brigade and succeeded in saving much property, which would otherwise have been destroyed. The fire has caused a profound feeling of regret and sympathy here. The grain burned at the Northern Railway station was fully insured. 
