The expenditure during the past year for education purposes amounted to a sarly \$16,000. The expenditure of the solution of the year was accessed \$20,000. expends u e on the salaries for the year was searly \$30,000; for building sites, repairs, &c., \$15,39 ·; for all purposes, \$55,879—\$10,500 over the total of 1872. The increase in the estimated value of school property was over \$30,000, and half of that amount had been expended in entirely new buildings. There were 53 unale teachers employed at an average salaries of the property \$230,000 and \$75,000 by male teachers employed at an average sary of nearly \$330, and 27 formle at an average of \$248. The evils arising from the frequent change of teachers were stated to have increased; 48 changes had taken place since the last report. The cause of this in must cross was indequate remuneration. While salaries had negly doubled in other cellings the stir. had nearly doubled in other callings, the sti-pends of teachers had not been so advanced, pends of eachers had not been so advanced twas to be noted however, with satisfaction that the average salaries of male teachers in th York had, in 1873 risen over that of 1872, by (3,10, and of female teachers by nearly \$3. 
