

A MEMBER OF THE GOVERNMENT ON THE STUMP.

The Hon. Archibald McKellar, the luxurious owner of the canoe couch (damask) and little Mrs. — is once more on the war path. The Commissioner of Public Works carries no weight in the House, and is of little assistance to his colleagues in the Cabinet, but on the stump Archibald is himself. His language there can be of the hap-hazard class, no necessity to confine himself to facts, he has his imagination to trade upon, and a livelier one than Munchausen himself possessed. In the House if a man makes a statement not strictly correct he is sure to be brought up with a round jerk, and that experience has often fallen to the lot of Mr. McKellar, but away in the woods there is no such restraining influence and the way the virtues of the Mowat Government are sung would lead one to believe that a Cabinet of heaven-born statesmen, ready-made and fashioned by celestial hands had been dropped down for the special benefit of Ontario. At the present time Mr. McKellar is exercising his ingenuity in North Wellington and so reckless have been his statements in reference to Provincial affairs that members of the Opposition in the Legislature have been compelled to go up and expose the falsity of the statements. From personal experience we are well acquainted with the nature of the harangues delivered by the Commissioner of Public Works, he is glib of tongue and free in his deliv- ering as a village pump, he will spout by the hour and if he be uninterrupted will coil more than a dozen ropes to hang himself with. A thorough partizan he allows the bitterness of his political feeling to warp his judgment and lead him on to the utterance of rash statements, which, when properly handled by an opponent, never fails to turn an audience of intelli- gent electors against the agitator. We hope he will be well waited on in North Wellington, and if he is, his visit is worth five hundred votes to Mr. McGowan, the Liberal-Conservative Candidate.

Mr McKenzie's Toronto organ would seem at last to have read M. Reil's manifesto, which was evident written to give M. Dorion opportunity to press his claims for an amnesty. It is rather amusing to note the effect which this document's perusal has had upon our contemporary's mind. Ever since the change of Government it has said that if an amnesty was promised Reil the present Cabinet would be obliged to see that it was granted. This was believed to be the most plausible excuse for Mr Mac- kenzie's assent to a course of conduct which he had previously decried. The organ has obtained new light. "The truth appears to be," it remarks, "that Sir John humbugged these men all along, but has evidently committed himself to nothing that could be laid hold of. If it had been otherwise the evidence would have been produced long ago." This is an important admission. Whether the word "humbugged" aptly describes Sir John's conduct, or not, it is not material to inquire. The organ confesses—and that is the only point which is material—that Sir John gave no promise of an amnesty, and if he had given it, that evidence of the fact would have been forthcoming long ago. We shall now see what the Government will do. In the face of the organ's confession they can no longer plead that they are bound by any pledge given by their predecessors to urge the granting of an amnesty, and by their own conduct they are tied down to opposition to amnesty until Reil and his associates have been properly tried in a competent court of law. It is evident that their wrigg- lings have got them into a crux, and it will be interesting to note how they pro- pose to get out of it.—Mail

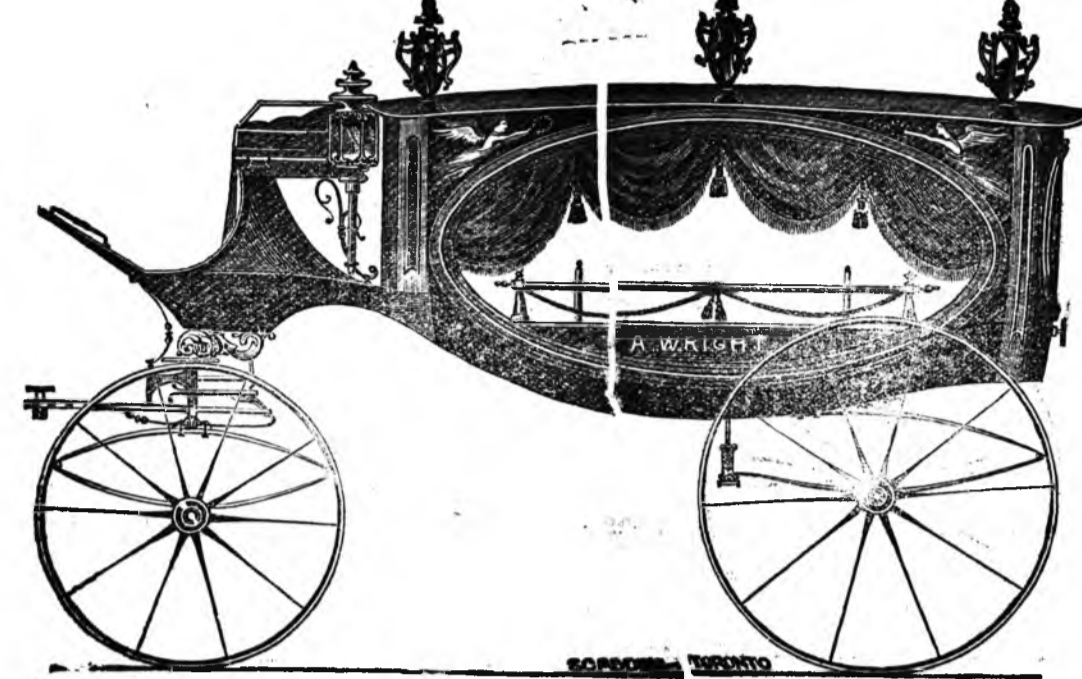
