HOW THEY DID IT.

GRIT PURITY IN BRISTOL.
The witnesses having been duly sworn, said:

1. "William McGregor is my brother. He keeps a bank. Large sums of money were disbursed by me without the knowledge of my brother. He was elected."
2. "My intention was to vote for whoever hired my team. I got the money after I recorded my vote."
3. "There was \$100 placed to my credit by McGregor & Brother. I spent about \$250, the balance being paid by cheques on McGregor & Brother."
4. "I voted at the election for William McGregor. A man named Chambers gave me eight dollars for my loss of time. I also got a jug of whiskey."
5. "I placed a memorandum of the amount I spent in an envelope, and left it at McGregor Brothers, so they might know how much I spent. The amount was over \$300."
6. "I got some money from Mr Robert McGregor for expenses. I got \$50 one or two weeks before the election."
7. "The candidate himself could not remember that he had expended personally more than \$1000."
Exit William McGregor.

GRIT PURITY IN MARQUETTE.
1. Sixty-two of the late Mr Cunningham's votes were proved illegal.
2. A great number of witnesses were examined, and the evidence revealed a frightful amount of fraud practised in the interest of Cunningham.
3. Among his agents were the Returning Officer and Poll Clerks in St. Francois Xavier East and West.
4. The Chief Justice denounced the conduct of Cunningham's agents as an enormous outrage and indictable by law.
5. The *Manitaban*, of which Mr Cunningham was editor and part proprietor, kicked the dead lion thus: "The Committee sitting with reference to the Marquette election has decided that Mr Ryan is entitled to the seat. 7. "Mr H. S. Macdonald gave me \$70 to canvass with. I canvassed a week before the election. I understood the money was to bribe voters with."
8. "I gave \$15 to Doctor. He voted for Macdonald. I gave the money to Doctor in charity."
9. "I received money, but can't say how much. I spent Dr. Bergin last time."
10. "I am a senior partner in the firm of McLennan & McDonald. I expended \$1500 for the respondent. I took an active part in the election, because I was anxious to defeat Dr. Bergin."
11. "I am the respondent in this case. My personal expenditure was between \$50 and \$100 during the election."
12. "I am Postmaster General. The respondent is my brother. I used my influence in my brother's favor."

1. "He then asked me how much I wanted, and I said \$25. We had the moon."

5. "My salary is \$900 a year. I am Capt. Norris' son-in-law. I spent about \$75 on the election. The amount of cash expended by Capt. Norris on the election was about \$800."
6. "The election account was headed missionary expenses. The whole missionary campaign was entered as amounting to \$70. Missionary hand and towel, \$75; Nigger Page for an entertainment to the colored people, \$15; Young Men's Christian Association for rent of room \$58.50."
7. "I am the respondent, I paid about \$5 to J. W. W. I paid \$100 for an affidavit, I have an account of all the sums I spent for election purposes. I sent to different parties \$665. A great deal of money was spent in this election and I paid nearly all of this the day before the election."

2. "Here's \$25 for your husband. You know how to fix him. Don't forget the name—Walker: Major Walker."
3. "I think that in twenty days I spent between \$500 and \$600. I spent a portion of the money in influencing men to vote for Major Walker."
4. "I gave Mrs S. \$25. Her husband is a haggard man. He voted for Major Walker."
5. "John Haggarty is a brakeman. I gave \$6 to his wife to influence him. He voted for Major Walker."
6. "I paid \$10 to a policeman for his vote. I forget his name."
7. "I got the \$500 to do all this from three persons. I understood they were always connected in business with Major Walker."
8. "I got money to do with it as my judgement dictated. I knew that I was doing what the law forbade."
9. "I am Major Walker's partner. Of about \$5000 I spent about \$1000 of my own. I took an interest in the election. I made an entry of the money I paid on a slip of paper and tore it up the day after the election."
10. "I had a conversation with Major Walker and offered him six votes for \$60. He promised me the money and the same in proportion for others."
11. "Election void on account of bribery."
