BY-LAW for the purpose of Funding that portion of the Municipal Loan Fund, coming to the Township of Vaughan, for the use of Schools.

M Assembly of the Province of Ontario, passed on the Twenty ninth day of March, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy Three for the nurpose of making a final settlement of the Municipal Loan Fund in debtedness by the several Municipalities in Ontario: and whereas in making a final concust and whereas, by an Act passed at the last session of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, an Act was passed empowering Townships to invest said moneys, arising from said Municipal Loan Fund, for the use of Schools: and whereas the amount apportioned to the Toweshin of Vaughan amounts to \$14,316.

And whereas it would be the most coducive to the interest of the ratepayers of the Township of Vaughan to invest said as

mount for the benefit and use of Schools within the Townshin; and whereas it is ex nediert under the provisions of said Act. submit a Rulaw to the ratenavers of the Township, for them to determine whether said money shall be permanently invested for the use of Schools within the Townshin.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal neil of the Cornoration of the Township of Vaughan, by and with the consent of the

ratenavers, as follows: 1st. That that portion of the Municipal Loan Fund now due to the Township of Vaughan, amounting to Fourteen Thousand Three Hundred and Sixteen Dollars, be in vested in Debentures or other Freehold se curities, for the nurpose of forming a Fund for the use and benefit of Schools within the

2nd That the interest accruing from said Fund shall be equally divided among the several School Sections within the Town.
