WATEREAS by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, passed on the Twenty ninth day of March, One Thousand Eight Hurd ed and Seventy indebtedness, it was deemed expedient to make a grant unto the Municipalities not indehted to the Government in the sum Two Dollars pro ratio according to the last census; and whereas, by an Act passed at the last session of the Legislative Assembly And whereas it would be the most conducive to the interest of the ratenavers of the Township of Vaughan to invest said at mount for the benefit and use of Schools

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township The West Riding of York Agricultural of Vaughan, by and with the consent of the ratepavers, as follows:

1st. 
