THE GRAIN TRADE.

After some six or eight months of almost total stagnation, the grain trade has suddenly sprung to life with renewed vigor, and the woc-be-gone countenances worn by the farmers lately, have almost dissappeared. It was thought at first, by some of the more longheaded business men, that the raise in wheat, barley, Dats, &c., was merely a scheme of some of the speculators who held large quantities of grain on hand, to enable them to dispose of their stock at an advantageous figure, but it can be very casily account ed for otherwise. The misfortune which has befallen the south of France will render necessary a large importation of wheat to supply the wants of the inun-dated districts. In Hungary there has been a similar disaster, although on a smaller scale, while in the west of England recent floods have done great damage to the wheat, that gave promise of an abundant harvest. These several causes will make the demand from Europe much greater than it has been for some years past, and it is the anticipation of this that has had such a good effect on our markets.

It is satisfactory to know that so far as judgment can be formed the supply of grain is likely to be large enough to meet the utmost demand which may be made upon it. The reports which have been received from all parts of the Dominion are very encouraging; in some parts where the Fall grain was thought to be
