ON THE RELATIONS OF THE MEDICAL PROFESSION TO PUBLIC HEALTH.

By EDWARD PLAYTER, M.D. I assure you gentlemen I have experienced no small degree of diffidence in endeavoring to comply with your expressed wish at July meeting, that I should read a paper on the present occasion.

Though a commonplace saw, it is an old one and a true, that "prevention is better than cure," and it applies more directly to our occupation than to any other.

Mr. Simon, the well known medical health officer, Great Britain, says we have no better authority than Mr. Simon, in 1871, writes "It seems certain that the deaths which occur in this country are fully a third more numerous than they would be if our existing knowledge of the chief causes of disease were reasonably well applied throughout the country."
