A barrel Corrected by Mr Isnac Crosby, Groces, and or other fruit shall—from and Dry Goods Merchant, Fire Proof Store, after the first day of July, 1876—be held to mean a barrel of the following inside dimersions: diamater at each head, 17 inches diamater at mid-length of the staves, 20 in ches: length between the heads, 26 inches; or of such other dimensions as will give a canacity of at least 25 gallons. 2. Every bargain for the purchase and sale of apples or other fruit, by the barrel, shall be unde-stood to be for barrels of the above dimensions. 3. Any person who uses for packing apples or other fruit, for sale, barrels of less dimensions or capacity than are herein stated, snall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall for the first offence incur a penalty of five dollars for every barrel so used, and a penalty of double the amount for every subsequent offence.
