The sick girl in the meantime endeavored to get to sleep. She had partially succeeded, when she was aroused by the sound of blows, and looking in the direction from whence they came, saw the inhuman mother holding the infant by a large wooden trunk. The sick girl in law succeeded in snatching the child from its mother's grasp, but not before the poor infant was beyond human aid. The occurrance took place at 7 a. m., and the helpless infant lived till 1 o'clock. Insanity is the reason assigned for the mother's conduct, who had, from time to time, demented spells, in which she has been known to attempt her own life with a razor, one occasion nearly succeed ing. Since then, however, she had appeared better, but of late these symp toms had returned. An inquest was held, and a verdict returned that the infant was murdered by its mother.
