If they have a fancy to embark in this dangerous business of buying and shipping grain, we recommend that the risk be undertaken, not by the whole Grange, but by a few of the richest amongst them.

British and Foreign. Several provinces of Portugal are suffering from a locust plague. There are 70,000 children living in boats in England, who receive no education.

A plot of ground has just been sold in the City of London at the rate of £10 15s. a square foot. In their first match in Dublin the Indian La Crosse players defeated the Canadians by three games to two.

Mr. Henry Irving was one of the guests at the Royal Academy dinner this year. He was the first actor to receive an invitation since Macready.

It is stated that Sir Salar Jung now staying with the Duke of Sutherland, comes with the reputation of being one of the most astute politicians in the East.

Professor Max Muller has gone to Germany for a year's holiday, which combined with change of air and society, he hopes will completely restore his health.

The German Protestant minister who resides at Jerusalem was lately attacked by a band of fanatic Mussulmans, and was only saved by the interference of the police.

The Italian Government Bill for improving the Tiber contemplated displacing, deepening, and embanking the bed within the walls of Rome. Garibaldi is partially satisfied.

The total length of railways constructed in the British Empire at the end of 1874 was 23,807 miles. In the whole world it is estimated that there were at the same 160,000 miles.

Most of the British railway companies have discovered that steel rails are much cheaper in the long run than the ordinary rolled iron ones, and large quantities have been used.

Another promotion for service in India is announced. Sir Richard Temple, who has hitherto been only a Knight Commander of the Star of India, has been created a Baronet of the United Kingdom.

A correspondent of the Times says the gold in the vaults of the Bank of France at the present exceeds 500 tons in weight. £150,000 weigh over a ton; £75,000,000, therefore, weigh 500 tons.

In the first twenty days of May the mean temperature was only 47 degrees at the Royal observatory, Greenwich, and was 4 degrees below the average for the corresponding period in 60 years.

One of the attractions of the Paris exhibition of 1875 is to be the largest balloon ever made. It will contain 13,000 cubic metres of gas, and is to be twenty-three to twenty-four metres in diameter. The car will hold fifty persons.

Under the direction of the Archbishop of Canterbury, certain steps are to be taken to effect the restoration of Lambeth Palace. It is to be hoped that the hand of the restorer will deal tenderly with the antique beauties of that unique ecclesiastical edifice.

In a sermon preached at Westminster Abbey last evening, the Rev. Dr. Butler paid a warm tribute to the Free Church of Scotland in connection with its mission on Lake Nyassa, and compared that undertaking with the most famous missionary exploits of past ages.

It is stated that Major His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, at present attending the 7th or 8th Queen's Own Hussars, will shortly be promoted to the rank of Colonel, and as such will take the command of the 1st Battalion of the Rifle Brigade, about to proceed to Dublin.

After a long discussion the Wesleyan Conference has adopted by an overwhelming majority a resolution declaring that the time has come when a comprehensive plan should be devised for some direct and adequate representation of the laity in the transaction of the business of the conference, in consistency with the recognized principles of the Wesleyan economy and the provisions of the Poll Book.

In a Convocation held at Oxford University a few days ago, it was resolved to confer the degree of Doctor of Civil Law by Diploma on his Royal Highness Prince Leopold. The Latin document embodying the resolution of the University specified the "comitas modesta, et simplicitas," which had won for Prince Leopold in his three years' residence the general regard, and expressed the hope and expectation that his father might live again in him.

A Renter telegram from Constantinople states that on Thursday night, the 15th inst, when the Turkish Council was sitting, an officer, recently dismissed from the army, entered the Chamber, shot and instantly killed the Minister of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and seriously wounded the Minister of Marine. He also killed an aide-de-camp of the Grand Visier, and a servant of the President of the Council. Revenge for his dismissal seems to have been the motive. Hassan, the assassin, was executed two days after.

The Council met on Tuesday, but no business was transacted. After reading the minutes of previous meeting the Council adjourned.

The Council met at 10 a. m., Wednesday, the Warden in the chair. The Warden laid on the table a letter from the County Treasurer enclosing the estimates for the year.

The expenditure for the year was estimated at \$78,099.73, and the income at \$50,374.10, leaving a balance of \$27,725.63 to levy. The rate proposed was 1 mill and 4.10 of a mill, being 3.10 of a mill less than last year.
