EASTERN WAR DISPATCHES.

VIENNA, Sept. 12.—Prince Gortschakoff has again renewed his proposals for a congress of Powers, with a view to a peaceful settlement of the Turkish question; but France and Austria decline to take part in it.

EASTERN WAR DISPATCHES.

BERGRADE, Sep. 12.—Official dispatches say there was severe fighting on Sunday and Monday between Deligrad and Alexinatz in consequence of the Turks attempting to throw a bridge across the Nava. They were unsuccessful. This movement indicates that the Turks despair of taking Alexinatz by direct attack, and are seeking to get to the rear of its fortified lines.

EASTERN WAR DISPATCHES.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The Standard's despatch from Belgrade says the answer of Turkey concerning the conditions of peace has been received, but has not yet been officially communicated. Russia will not permit Serbia to accept Turkey's terms.

Street tramways are about to be laid in Adelaide. The King of Denmark has opened an Industrial Exhibition at Aarhus, the largest town in Jutland.

The first ground has been broken on the Champ de Mars for the Paris International Exhibition of 1876. Herr Krupp, the gun-maker, is reported to be the richest man in Northern Germany.

Fifteen years ago there were only sixteen thousand Jews in Paris. There are now over fifty thousand. Three hundred colliers at Stonehill Colliery, Farnworth, near Bolton, have struck work against a reduction of wages.

The revenue of the colony of South Australia for the year ended June 30th amounted to £1,316,800, which is largely in excess of the estimate. One hundred and twenty miners of Messrs. Dickinson's colliery, Annfield Plain, Durham, have received notice to leave on account of the continued depression of trade.

British and Foreign.

On Saturday the colliers at New Engine Colliery, Forest of Dean, were discharged under notice, it being intended to discontinue coal getting. The shafts, however, will be extended. So large a number of Warwickshire miners have succeeded from the union that the allowance for widows and orphans, as well as sick benefits and superannuation grants, have had to be temporarily suspended.

British and Foreign.

A St. Petersburg telegram says there is no truth in the report that a rising has broken out among the Mahomedan population of the Caucasus, though Turkish emissaries have been endeavouring to foment one. The box wood used by engravers is brought from the region of the Black and Caspian seas, and is scarce to grow in any other place. A cubic foot of it weighs seventy-five pounds, and the prices range from \$75 to \$250 a ton.

The Cologne Gazette says that Frau Theresa Fiedler von Hulsentine, who died a few days ago at Prague, had attained the age of 119 years. She was born at Hamburg in 1757, and was in her youth a maid of honor to the Empress Maria Theresa.

On the 1st of next January it will be seventy years since the Emperor of Germany entered the Prussian Army, even before he had accomplished his tenth year. The usage now is that the Prussian Princes enter the army after completing their tenth year.

The members of the Keighley Board of Guardians have at last found that law is stronger than opinion, and they are now all broken down and in the hands of the law, there to remain—should no unexpected hiatus bring about their release—until the 2nd November next, when they will be brought before the Queen's bench division of the High Court of Justice, to answer "Certain trespasses and contempts." The names of the six guardians are Messrs. R. A. Milner (chairman), J. B. Sedwick, David Normington, Titus Orden, Hezekiah Tempest, and James Newbold.

British and Foreign.

A shocking outrage, which will in all probability end fatally, has occurred at Brompton Barracks, Chatham. Early on Monday morning Private Thompson, Royal Engineers, was found in a courtyard of the barracks in an insensible state. Upon medical examination it was found that his skull was fractured, his right arm and leg broken, his jaw smashed, and his teeth knocked out. On somewhat recovering he said he was thrown out of the window whilst asleep by his comrades, and a number of them, including a noncommissioned officer, are in custody.
