The following pupils of the Newmarket High School have matriculated in Universities at the late Examination:— Thomas Bolton, in McGill University; William Widdifield, in Toronto University; Charles McCracken, in the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario. This last examination, that of Charles McCracken is accepted by all British Universities and Medical Schools as equivalent to their matriculation examination in Medicine. Thomas Bolton and William Widdifield will be regarded as having passed the Intermediate Examination of last June, thus making five in all who passed the "intermediate." The School was lately visited and examined by J. M. Buchan, Esq., M. A., High School Inspector, who expressed himself as highly satisfied with the attainments of the present pupils, especially in Mathematics and Classics. The Fall Term has just opened with an attendance of about 36.
