## LAW CONCERNING NEWSPAPERS.

1. Any person who takes a paper regularly from a post office, whether directed in his name or another's, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for payment.

2. If a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears of the publishers may continue to send it until payment is made, and then adjust the whole account, whether the paper is taken from the office or not.

3. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post office, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

## The Week's News.

Rykert still has a majority of one vote. The Duchess of Edinburgh has a daughter. Alfred Allott failed in Sheffield for \$100,000.

The Ottawa water works were seized for a debt. Hon. Mr. Cartwright has left England for home. Ex-Mayor Medcalfe intends to try for the civic chair.

Hon. Adam Crooks delivered an address at Hamilton. Russia has given orders for sheds for a winter campaign.

It is said the Newfoundland fisheries have proved a failure. Tilden obtained a majority in New York state of 33,000.

Snow in Orangeville on Sunday fell to the depth of six inches. There has been great excitement in the sugar market lately.

Four prisoners escaped from the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary. Several important Russian ports have been obstructed with torpedoes.

Marechal the great diamond robber at Montreal, has made a confession. The Lincoln election scrutiny has been adjourned until the 4th December.

Boss Tweed arrived in New York on Thursday in the steamer Franklin. A revolution has broken out in the Mexican state of Lower California.

A thirteen year old girl was married in Ottawa to a fifteen year old boy. Luncheon has been more active lately and better prices have been received.

A man deeply in debt in Ottawa, sold his property and left for parts unknown. Four men attacked and gagged a watchman of the Waterville National Bank.

Bottled ale has been shipped from London, Ontario, for the Australian Exhibition. Steamship City of Richmond took out \$750,000 in specie from Liverpool for New York.

The morning papers in Montreal have reduced the rate of composition from 33 1/2 to 30 cents. The middle still continues in connection with the election of President of the United States.

A room is being fitted up in the Parliament buildings for Canadian ores, exhibited at Philadelphia. The Right Hon. Jas. Whiteside, Lord Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench in Ireland, is dead.

Alden the young American has been found guilty of murder at Hamilton, and sentenced to be hanged on the 12th January. Sir Hugh Allan is of the opinion that some experience in working the Intercolonial Railway should be had, before the mail steamers be required to call at Halifax.

Mrs. Alex. Murray, wife of the President of the Dominion Type Founding Co., by mistake took a heavy dose of Morphine in Montreal on the 12th, and died in five hours. William Houston sub-editor of the Globe, has been brought up for contempt of court in the case Simpson vs. Wilkinson, and made to pay the costs and to give an ample apology.

Mr. Lafamme the new Minister has been returned by a majority of only 28. The men on Government works used every exertion in his favor and to them is contributed his return.

An extraordinary scene took place in the French Chamber of Deputies on Friday last, during a debate on the Public Works Estimates. Prince Napoleon spoke for the first time since his election, making a fierce attack on the clergy.

Notice has been forwarded to the Messrs. Allan's, that the mail steamers will in future be required to ship and land at Halifax the mails to and from Great Britain during the winter months. The mail steamer next sailing from Liverpool will land the mails at Halifax.

The whole of the new Russian loan has been taken up.

Small-pox is raging in Keewatin among the Icelanders and Indians.

Hon. David Laird has been sworn in as Lieut-Governor of the North West.

A board of health has been appointed to assist the Lieut-Governor in the province of Keewatin.

It is said an explanation will be demanded for the missing of so many troops at Washington.

A heavy suit against the New York and Oswego Midland R.R. Co. representing \$6,000,000, is on trial in New York.

Thousands of workmen have been discharged from the British iron works. Whilst in America trade is improving in this line.

An unauthenticated rumor recently appeared in some of the Continental newspapers, that the Russian Mediterranean squadron had been ordered to America.

The ratepayers of Quebec have petitioned the Legislature, to withhold any amendments to the city charter until it shall have received from the corporation a full statement of the latter's financial affairs.

On Monday Mr. D. McCarthy Q. C. applied to the Court of Queen's Bench on behalf of defendant in the case of the Queen against Wilkinson, calling on the Hon. G. Brown to show cause why a writ of attachment should not issue against him as publisher of the Globe, for an article that appeared in that paper on the 8th July, reflecting on the judgment given by Judge Wilson. The court granted the application.

## MARKHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

The Markham Township Council met at Sizes Hall Unionville, on Saturday 25th inst.

Members present, Messrs. Robinson, Milliken, Marsh and Reesor. The Reeve in the chair.

Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Petitions were presented.

By the Reeve from W. B. Saunders and 19 others asking aid for Christopher Crozier, who has had his leg smashed by the bursting of a saw.

By Mr. Marsh from David Lynott and eight others asking for a grant to furnish gravel for Road Div. No. 6.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Marsh, moved that the sum of ten dollars be granted to Edward Leathers and Richard Ball, being for ditching and filling in an old culvert opposite lot No. 8, Con. 10.

Mr. Marsh, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the sum of \$9 dollars be granted for the purpose of completing the contract for building a bridge in front of lot No. 1, Con. 2.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Marsh, moved that the sum of twenty-five dollars be granted to the trustees of the Presbyterian burying ground on lot No. 10, Con. 8, for making an approach to the same; said approach necessitated by the hill in front thereof being cut down, the above trustees agreeing to accept the above sum in full of all demands against this municipality for making such improvements, and that the Reeve order the sum to be paid.

Mr. Marsh, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the sum of \$42.20 be paid to Weight & Son, for furnishing 428 feet of plank for culvert on side line in the Con. 7.

Mr. Marsh, seconded by Mr. Milliken, moved that the sum of \$6.74 be paid to the Reeve, being money advanced by him to repair a bridge in front of lot No. 9, Con. 7.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Milliken, moved that the following sums be paid to the under mentioned parties, or their order for gravel put on the roads: To Jas. Dimma \$6.05; Wm. P. Munroe \$16.65; Jas. Reid \$3.36; A. B. Ramey \$1.40.

Mr. Marsh, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the sum of \$60 be granted for the purpose of repairing bridges and furnishing gravel for Road Div. No. 5, and that David Lynott, Lawrence Smith and James Robinson be Commissioners to expend the same.

Mr. Marsh, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the sum of \$150 per week be granted for the support of Wm. Watson, an indigent man without any means of support; the said sum payable to the order of John Morgan, Esq., and to continue to be paid during the pleasure of this council.
