Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Communications received from the different school teachers, thanking the Board for their re-appointment for the year 1877.

Mr. Wickson, seconded by Mr. Robinson, moved that the Christmas vacation extend from 22nd December to January 8th.—Carried.

To the Board of Trustees, Yorkville Public School. GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to report that during the months of May, June and October, of the present year I have twice inspected the various departments of your public schools, at which times I have carefully examined all the classes in the various branches of study, and was very much pleased to find the schools conducted with marked ability in each of the departments.

Unionville. Unionville Grange, P. of H., No. 269, will hold their annual meeting for the election of officers, on Thursday, 14th inst., at two o'clock. In the evening an entertainment and oyster supper will be given at Mr. A. Size's. Several able speakers from Division and other Granges are expected to address the meeting.

SCARBORO COUNCIL. The Scarborough Township Council met at Mrs. Johnston's hotel, Woburn, on Monday 27th inst, 1876.

Communication from the Provincial Treasurer, with remittance of \$61.26, Clergy Reserve Fund. Several accounts were presented.

Mr. Chester, seconded by Mr. Tredway, moved that the Treasurer do pay to George Norton the sum of \$18, being two thirds of the loss sustained by him by having three sheep killed by dogs unknown to him; and also \$11.33 to Arthur Martin, for loss sustained by him by having two ewes and one lamb killed by a dog or dogs unknown.

Mr. Tredway, seconded by Mr. Richardson, moved that the Treasurer retain out of the township funds the sum of \$10 for the relief of an aged destitute man named Peter Roy.

Mr. Tredway asked leave to introduce a by-law to appoint the places for holding the nomination of candidates for the respective offices of the Reeve, Deputy Reeve, and Councillors. Leave given.

Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Chester, moved that the Treasurer pay to the Reeve the sum of \$10 to be expended for the relief of Henry Jackson, a colored man, he being in destitute circumstances.

Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Chester, moved that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the following accounts, viz: Francis Boudoin, \$7.33; Jesse Chapman, \$5.33; Jas Ormerod, \$6.66; said sums being two thirds of the loss sustained by them by having sheep killed by a dog or dogs to them unknown.

Mr. Richardson, seconded by Mr. Tredway, moved that the sum of \$12 be and is hereby granted for the purpose of repairing the bridge on the sidewalk between lots 20 and 21, con D; said sum payable on order of J. P. Wheeler, Esq., commissioner.

Mr. Stephenson, seconded by Mr. Chester, moved that the account of Mr. W. A. Mine, amounting to \$107.31, for plank for culverts and bridges be paid by the Treasurer.

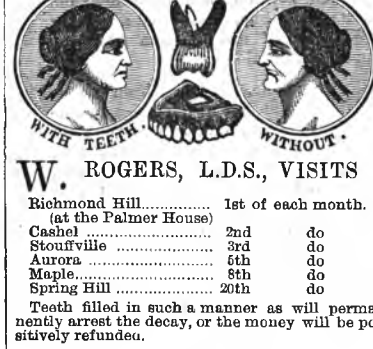
