Notes and Comments. The election for a member to represent Cardwell in the House of Commons, in place of the late Mr. Cameron, came off yesterday.

The Week's News. A fire at Ottawa of the new market house, loss \$30,000. An important Trade's Union case has been tried at Montreal.

The Returning Board of Louisiana, Florida and South Carolina have made their report giving Hayes nominally a majority of one in the electoral college for the entire Union.

EASTERN VIRGINIA. Fredericksburgh, Nov. 11, 1876. To the Editor of The Herald.

DEAR SIR,—It is over 270 years since the first settlement in Eastern Virginia by a London Company.

The Duke of Abercorn will surrender the Viceroyalty on the 6th of December, and his successor will be sworn in on the 7th.

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British and Foreign.

The Austrian Government are about to build an Embassy house in London. Mr. George Slack, of Trinity College, Dublin, has died from an overdose of opium.

A resolution to make the Gateshead Mechanics Institution a free library has been defeated. The Roman Catholic students at the Queen's College, Cork, form 52.4 per cent. of the whole.

Sir John Kilk is stated to have purchased the Tedworth estate, Wiltshire, for about £220,000. A sailors' shelter to accommodate 500, and erected at a cost of £800, has been opened at Lowestoft.

It is in contemplation to raise an ambulance corps in London in connection with the Volunteers. A movement has been set on foot at Cambridge for the raising of a memorial to the late Dr. Cockson.

Colonel G. T. Hiller has been appointed Inspector-General of Irish Constabulary, in room of Colonel Sir John S. Wood. The Duke of Abercorn will surrender the Viceroyalty on the 6th of December, and his successor will be sworn in on the 7th.

A movement is being started at Kildermister to raise a statue to Sir Rowland Hill, the introducer of the penny postage system. A dayman of Hyde, who advertised his "mixture" as the best quality of "milk and water," has been fined under the Adulteration Act.

The decision of the Liverpool County Court has decided that a railway company is obliged to furnish a first-class carriage free from tobacco smoke if a traveller so desires. Alderman Sir R. Carden, of London, has made an order for the destruction of 40,000 pounds of tea, bonded nine years ago, and the present owners of which are not known.

Mr. Butt, has withdrawn unconditionally an action in which he claimed £10,000 damages for an alleged libel published in the Daily Express on the 23d of August last. The early closing of the Baltic ports this year has seriously affected the North of England coal trade, and fears are entertained that between 1000 and 1500 men will soon be deprived of labor.

John Roberts, jun., the billiard champion, who has been playing in Australia, has received £1,000 and expenses to visit and play in New Zealand. Thereafter he will go to India for three weeks for £600. The greater part of Bryston Hall, near Pontefract, Yorkshire, the seat of Lord Houghton, has been destroyed by fire. The valuable library, the pictures, and nearly all the furniture, were, however, fortunately saved.

A guarantee fund of £7,650 has been raised for the Leeds Musical Festival of 1877. Two English composers have undertaken to write specially for the festival—one a sacred oratorio, the other a secular cantata. The Roman Catholic Union of Ireland has adopted resolutions urging the Government to grant a system of education—primary, intermediate, and university—in accordance with the religious views of the Irish people.

The secretary of the British Iron Trade Association has received an official communication from the Foreign Office to the effect that the existing duties on iron entering Germany may be expected to cease from the first of January next. At a large meeting of the members of the Royal Irish Academy, Dublin, three leaders of the Home-Rule movement were put up for election—Mr. Isaac Butt, M. P.; Mr. Edmund Dwyer Grey, proprietor of the Freeman's Journal; and Mr. Charles Dawson. On a ballot, they were all blackballed.

Capt. Naves has written to Admiral Elliot requesting that the Queen may be informed that the officers and men of the 'Alert' and 'Discovery' are deeply grateful to her Queen for her gracious expression of appreciation, and he prouly records that to uphold British honor and Christian duty to the death was the pre-eminant determination of all their command.

Mr. Henry Chaplin, M. P. for Mid Lincolnshire, was married to Lady Florence Leveson Gower, the eldest daughter of the Duke of Sutherland, on the 15th inst. The bridegroom is 36, the bride 21 years of age. The bride presents were very numerous, and some of a costly description. Her Majesty sent the bride a beautiful gold bracelet, set with diamonds and pearls. The Prince and Princess of Wales gifted included a superb diamond bracelet.

MOLTEN LEAD AGAINST PLUCK. We have much pleasure in recording an act of courageous self-control and presence of mind which may be compared with advantage to the honors won by deeds of daring on the field of battle. Two workmen were engaged fixing a lightning conductor on the summit of the steeple at Ville-sur-Ourthe, in Belgium. To accomplish the somewhat difficult and delicate task it was necessary that one of the workmen should stand on the shoulders of his companion. While in this position a violent gust of wind made him spill some molten lead, which fell on the hand and forearm of his friend. Notwithstanding the sudden intensity of the pain thus inflicted, the victim of this accident had the courage to remain motionless while the lead burnt its way into his flesh. He knew that the slightest movement might suffice to precipitate his companion from a height of seventy feet into the street below, and he bravely endured the pain rather than imperil the life of his fellow worker. M. A. Karis, slater, at Antwerp, is the hero of this brave deed, and his name is worthy of public record. [London Builder.]
