

Richmond Hill and Vicinity.

The Liberal Conservative Association of West York met at Weston, on the 13th. In consequence of the bad roads, and a few of the sub divisions not getting notice, there being only about one hundred delegates present, it was, therefore, thought better to adjourn until the regular quarterly meeting of the Association which takes place on the first Wednesday in December, when a candidate will be selected. The Liberal in giving a short account of the meeting, states what is not according to facts; when saying that there was a division in the camp in regard to the selecting of a candidate. For there was no nomination made neither did any one offer himself as a candidate.

The North York Sabbath School Convention met on Thursday the 7th inst., in the M. E. Church at the village. The attendance of fifteen took place. The next meeting will be held in Aurora. The affairs of the convention appear to be prospering.

According to the Liberal, the Reform convention for West York meets in Toronto on the 31st inst. which would be on Sunday, if there were 31 days in this month, for the selection of a victim.

There is a pretty lively time here at present in consequence of the taxes being so high. At the last meeting of the Council, a committee was appointed to look over the printing account, which was suspiciously large.

The F. O. G. T. intend giving a free entertainment on Wednesday evening, the 27th inst. Consisting of everything that goes to make up a first-class concert.

The Crisis are in a bad way because the Conservatives have not nominated a candidate for the Local House, - have patience, gentlemen, we are in no hurry.

It is thought that the Reformers of this place will nominate a full ticket at the next Municipal election. The Conservatives only intend contesting the Reeveship.

'Ratepayer' is the same person who wrote over the signature of "Elector," a few weeks ago. The hand writing is on the wall; he had better take warning.

The Liberal, we understand, is not favorably received at certain Post Offices in York.

Aurora streets are to be lighted with lamps.

Brown, Ephraim Whitmore; No. 4, Messrs. E. Clubine, A. McQuarrie, James Watson, Dr. Rupert, W. DeVing; No. 5, Messrs. Dr. Grant, John Watt, Geo. Elliott, David Stouhouse, Jonathan Ellery; No. 6, Messrs. Alexander Malloy, Dr. Stevenson, Alex. Gough, W. Capner, J. L. Card; No. 7, Messrs. Nattress, Thos. Webster, Thompson Porter, J. C. Kurtz, Robert Kellam. Richmond Hill village - Messrs. Robert Law, William Treuch, Alex. Moodie, and J. M. Lawrence.

The Conservatives so far have not yet appointed a candidate to contest the local election. The decision appears to be between Mr. Tyrrell, of Weston, and Mr. Armstrong, of Vaughan. The latter was very active during the late Commons election, while the West York man has for several years been connected with the Township and County Councils.

Our Texas Letter. Corsicana, Nov. 3rd, 1878. DEAR SIR, - I was certainly surprised at the turn your politics have taken, as told by the Globe you sent me.

Our State elections come off on Tuesday. Every officer is "elected" here, from Constable to Governor. Three Parties have come out of the middle, viz.: Democratic, Greenback and Republicans. All have tickets in the field. The Republicans merely for the sake of keeping together.

I enclose you one of the Democratic tickets. It is wonderful the support that the Greenback fizzle is getting. Judge Roberts is likely to be the future Governor. He is a hard money man. He has also, already been in communication with Dr. Burleson, on the subject of School Legislation.

Many important changes in the legislative and executive machinery of the State, is expected from the near future, so as much as possible and as fast as possible, to bring us up to the proper standard of civilization and good citizen-ship.

A commission of five laymen was appointed by the last Legislature to revise and codify the laws as arranged by the last State Convention. Their work has to be adopted or rejected as seen fit by the next Legislature.

Of the Yellow Fever doing you will be as well informed as I am. It must have been horrible. Thirty volunteer physicians have died in Memphis alone, and I do not estimate that \$1,000,000 would be an over estimate of the contributions from all sources for the relief of the sufferers. A commission has been appointed by the General Government, to investigate, if possible, the cause of its origin, with a view to prevention in future. Dr. Choppin, of New Orleans, thinks it was imported. Owing to the strict quarantine observed by this State, not a single case of real fever is known to have occurred, and now frost has dispelled any danger in that respect, so far as we are concerned.

We have only had three light showers since the last of June. The drouth, however, unless drying up cisterns and tanks, has caused a little inconvenience, while it has afforded an excellent time for gathering the corn and cotton in good condition, for some reason, however, the price of cotton is very low.

Several executions have marked the course of justice as being in the right direction, this year. While affairs along the border are daily becoming more satisfactory. Wm. Sullivan formerly of Barrie, seems to have spread himself, so that he now occupies one of the foremost places in town, and claims to have the best boot & shoe store between Galveston and St. Louis. He is the first in this part who seems to have attempted advertising by posters on the fences, etc.

Our general politics it might be wisdom to say nothing. Negro education and legislation is the problem of the South just now. Despite, however, all the denunciations and indignities which it has afforded a time to the surface of society, cannot but agree with the late governor of a northern state "That the nation has gone into a committee of the whole, and that after every subterfuge and nostrum has been examined and found wanting," each and all will gradually return to common sense and honest duty.

By-Law No. 152.

To raise the sum of FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS by Debentures, upon the credit of the Municipality of the VILLAGE OF BRADFORD for the erection of a MODEL SCHOOL HOUSE, PURCHASING LAND FOR SCHOOL SITE, and IMPROVING THEREON, in the said Village of Bradford.

WHEREAS it is necessary and expedient to raise by loan the sum of FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS, payable within TWENTY YEARS from the date this By-law shall be finally passed and take effect, with interest at the rate of SEVEN per cent per annum, to be applied to the erection of a MODEL SCHOOL HOUSE, PURCHASE OF LAND FOR SCHOOL SITE, and IMPROVING AND PURCHASING THEREON, in the Village of Bradford;

And whereas for the payment of Interest upon and for the creation of a Sinking Fund for liquidation of the principal of the sum of FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS, the sum of FOUR HUNDRED AND EIGHTY DOLLARS will require to be levied and collected, according to an Act respecting the Municipal Institutions of Ontario. (Chap. 174, Revd. Stat. of Ontario.

And whereas the Assessed Value of the whole rateable property in the Village of Bradford for the present year is THREE HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS, and EIGHTY-THREE DOLLARS according to the last revised Assessment Roll.

And whereas to raise the said sum of FOUR HUNDRED AND EIGHTY DOLLARS, it is hereby resolved that the rate of ONE AND ONE-SEVENTH PER CENT SHALL BE levied upon the rateable property aforesaid, which will require to be one mill and four sevenths of a mill on the Dollar.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the Municipality is as follows: FIVE THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED AND SIXTY DOLLARS, and interest, the sum of SIXTY HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIVE DOLLARS, and in the aggregate the sum of SIX THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED AND THIRTY DOLLARS, and SIXTY-FIVE DOLLARS, and interest thereon, at the rate of SEVEN per cent per annum, said interest payable on the FIRST DAYS OF JANUARY and JULY in each year.

That the said sum of FOUR THOUSAND (say \$4000) DOLLARS be raised by loan upon the credit of the Municipality.

That Debentures to the sum of TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS each, be issued by the Council, not exceeding the sum of FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS.

That the Debentures be made payable on the FIRST DAY OF JULY in the year of our Lord ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND NINETY EIGHT, and bear interest at the rate of SEVEN per cent per annum, said interest payable on the FIRST DAYS OF JANUARY and JULY in each year.

That the Debentures, both as to principal and interest, be made payable at any place in this Province, and be expressed in the lawful currency of this Province.

That the said sum of FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS, being the amount required for the purpose in the recital mentioned, and necessary to defray the expenses thereof, be laid out and expended in the ERECTION OF A MODEL SCHOOL HOUSE, PURCHASING OF SCHOOL SITE, AND IMPROVING THEREON, in the Village of Bradford.

That the said annual special rate of ONE MILL AND FOUR SEVENTHS OF A MILL on the DOLLAR, upon the Assessed Value of all the rateable property in the Village of Bradford for the present year, over and above, and in addition to all other rates whatsoever shall be levied, raised and collected in each and every year from the FIRST DAY OF JULY, 1878, until the FIRST DAY OF JULY, 1898, both years inclusive, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said sum of FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS, with interest thereon as aforesaid.

That this By-law shall come into operation and take effect from the FOURTEENTH day of OCTOBER, ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-EIGHT.

That the votes of the qualified electors of this Municipality upon this By-law, shall be taken on the SEVENTH day of OCTOBER, ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-EIGHT, at the TOWN HALL, in the Village of Bradford, by ROBT. STEWART, who is hereby appointed Returning Officer, and who is hereby authorized to take the poll, and to receive and count the votes of the electors of the said Municipality, and to give notice thereon at the TOWN HALL, on

Monday, 7th day of October, 1878, Commencing at the hour of Nine o'clock, a.m. ROBT. STEWART, Town Clerk.
