The National Policy.

Cauada has the much-taiked-of and much abused National Pelior at last, and opportunity will now be given to see whether this Policy will preve as beneficial to Canada as its friends and advocates ascert. We see no good reason why it should not do so, -- why Canada should not be benfitted by it equally as well as other nations. Many Reformers, however, already condemn the policy before they have seen it tried, and thereby show themselves as bigoted and foolish as the man who attempted to answer every question before he had heard the half of it. But what must be the scelings of those bitter partizans who so shamefully abused Sir John MacDonald for deceiving the people The Reform popers named bim "the Arch deceiver," and asserted that ali his promises were only made to hood wink the electors. If there is the slightest feeling of honor left in some of these who so cruelly slandered Sir John, we think they must have felt a blush of thame and confusion mentling their countenances, when they saw low thoroughly he had carried out his premises in regard to a protective rolicy. No one having any regard for the truth can deny that the Conservative Covernment has carried out to the ful lest extent the premises made. Here the Conservatives show a great contrast to the Reformers. Mackenzie made many promises, but his five years record proves conclusively that little or scarcely any effort was made to fulfil them. No doubt the present Government was jud ed by them according to their own old hulf bushel, but the measure proved at fault in this instance.

The tatiff, as now framed, shows that some of the ablest minds of the country have assisted in its construction. No wouder that a little time was required for such a task. The country will not grudge the time spent in preparation. when they find it working successfully Again, in this instance, the Grits thought Tilly should bring cown the tariff as quickly as Cartwright did, but Tilly frames his tariff to stand, not to be speedily withdrawn after the manner of Richard John, "the heaven born financier," whose blunder in this line, caused such a storm of indignation among the business men as to cause its immediate

This tariff evinces foresight, good judgment, and thorough knowledge of the many details of different industries through the country. It is so framed that those of our industries which have been unequally struggling against foreign competition, are now afforded a judic ous, and fostering, but not an indiscreet or absolute protection. They are now placed on an even, or slightly favorable footing with their rivals, but in no line is the duty so high as to compel Canadians to buy an inferior or worthless article, at an increased price. The de sign has not been to completely shut out the foreign manufacturer, but to make him pay the revenue of the country, and therefore make less profit on theri manufactures. It prevents him from controlling the market, and forcing our men to the wall, but at the same time, Canadian manufacturers will have to meet the requirements of the people in good workmanship, and improved designs, or the foreigner will find it to his advantage to pay the duty, and content himself with a small profit. Canadian manufac-

merly compete successfully ag inst an American capitalist with a long established business. But by the new tariff, if the Americans avail themselves of the Canadian market, they must contribute to our revenue. And the duty which they pay the Government is just so much taken off their profits,-just so much money kept in the country, and so much less has to be raised from Canadians, by other means, to pay running expense; and then, too, the fact that the foreigner pays the duty and makes less profit enables the Canadian to meet him in the market, and contest sales on the merit of the articles; - or undersell his rival. The tariff is not Prohibitive, but l'intective. The Canadian is not left absolute master of the field, able to force wo, thicks articles on his countrymen at exhorbitant prices, but he is chabled to stand side by side with ing next. his rival, show the excellence of his arti cles, and, in some instances, undersell the man who has a heavy duty to pay.

We notice that the new tariff is deneunced because of the hard feeling it may raise between England and Canada. Such talk is all ronsense. England is not so foolish as some of her loud-pro fessing friends affirm. There can be no disloyalty in Luilding up our own country, and raising a tevenue in the easiest and least burdensome manner If our Reform friends cannot advance better arguments, they should not say anything, but look most wonderfully sad and wise. It might have a better and more telling effect in their favor.

Another reason that is given why the ariff will not work, and should be withdrawn, is because of the rings that may be formed to control the market. This is true we may have some rings, but because there must necessarily be slightly inconvenient or injurious result connected with the policy, is no reason why the great, good and lusting effects aris. ing from such policy should be condemned.
