

Markham Township Council.

The above Council met at Hall's hall, Unionville, on Saturday the 28th ult. Members all present. The Reeve in the chair. The minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

A petition was presented by Mr. Reesor, from T. W. Hobson and twelve others, asking a grant of \$100 to purchase gravel to put on sidewalk allowance between Lots 10 and 11, in the 7th Con.

A communication was received from R. Cunningham, road overseer Div. No. 16, drawing attention of the Council to fences between Lots Nos. 4 and 5, front of 4th Con., being on road allowance, and asking that action should be taken to have them put in their proper places.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Treasurer pay the account of R. Cunningham, road overseer Div. No. 16, being for 420 feet of lumber at \$10 per M., amounting to \$4.20.

Mr. Kester, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the sum of \$2 be paid to P. Cooney for ditching and cleaning twenty-two feet of ditch on sidewalk between Lots 20 and 21, in the 8th Con., and that the Treasurer pay the same on order of the mover.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the Treasurer pay Thomas Cleary the sum of \$8, for brush for the German Mill hill road, said sum payable on order of the commissioners.

Mr. Kester, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the Treasurer pay the sum of \$11.18 to John M. Kester, for 800 feet of lumber and cedar stringers for bridge and sluiceway on the 10th Con., road Div. No. 60.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the Treasurer pay \$4 each to the following persons, viz: Drs. W. W. Robinson, Eckardt and S. L. Freil, being for certificates granted in the matter of the insanity of Amanda Tomlinson.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the Treasurer pay the account of Messrs. Delamer, Black & Reesor, in the matter of Public School By-law, Stouffville vs. Markham.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the account of Mr. James Lawrie, jr., being for building a bridge and furnishing material for the same in road Div. No., 60 amounting in all to \$19 63, be paid by the Treasurer.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the Treasurer pay the account of Peter Doynton, overseer Div. No. 11, for 611 feet of lumber at \$8 per M., amounting to \$4.96.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Treasurer pay Jacob Heise the sum of \$10, for 100 yards gravel placed upon Div. No. 6, as certified to by P. Finnie, road overseer.

Mr. Kester, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the account of Corson & Son be paid by the Treasurer, amounting to \$16.50, for printing.

Mr. Kester, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the sum of \$3 be paid by the Treasurer to Joseph Sherrick, for 5 posts, 100 feet lumber and ditching.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Treasurer pay the following accounts for gravel, as certified to by the overseer of road Div. No., 31, viz: Geo. Eakin, 60 yards, at 10 cents, \$6; David Johnston, 130 yards, at 10 cents, at \$13; H. P. Crosby, 400 yards, at 10 cents, \$40.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to notify all the Public School Boards of the Municipality as to the changes in the law in reference to the levying of the rate in the respective school sections.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the Clerk be instructed to get 250 copies of Voters Lists printed in the usual form, and that the Clerk be also instructed to supply extra copies to parties desiring the same upon payment of the price fixed by the statute, and place the proceeds to the credit of this municipality.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the Treasurer pay Jas Gardner the sum of \$1 60 towards the earthwork at the German Mill Road on order of the commissioners.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the sum of \$50 be granted to purchase gravel on Lot 10, 7th Con.; said sum payable by the Treasurer on order of the Reeve.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Treasurer pay William Gardner the sum of \$7, for building abutments at the German Mill bridge, on order of the commissioners.

Mr. Kester, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the Treasurer pay the sum of \$3 for use of each polling booth used at the last Local election in this municipality.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the name of D. Reesor, jr., in By-Law No. 307, be erased and the name of Edward Leathers be inserted in lieu thereof and that the seal of the corporation be attached to this resolution.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Treasurer pay S. S. Cameron the sum of \$6, for supervision of the driving of piles at the German Mill bridge; said sum payable on order of James Gardner.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the Treasurer pay the sum of \$128, for straightening creek, building new bridge and filling old bed of creek where old bridge was at Headford; said amount payable on order of the commissioners when the work is completed.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the sum of \$10 be granted to repair the road between Lots 10 and 11, in the 10th Con., and that F. Pike and Wm. Armstrong be commissioners to expend the same; said sum payable by the Treasurer on order of the commissioners when the work is completed.

Mr. Kester, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that \$20 be paid by the Treasurer for repairing the bridge on the sidewalk between Lots 25 and 26 in the 7th Con., said sum payable by order of the Reeve.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Clerk notify S. S. Cameron and J. Harris, road overseers, to have the lumber from the old bridges in their divisions properly cared for.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that the Treasurer pay Wm. Gardner \$20, for repairing breakwater and channel at the German Mills said sum payable on order of the commissioners when the work is completed.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Kester, moved that \$30 be granted to gravel the eastern towlaine, commencing at Bedford and going north, upon condition that Pickering grant an equal amount, and that Col. Patton, Wm. Boyd, and Wm. Armstrong be commissioners to expend the same; said amount payable by the Treasurer on order of the commissioners when the work is completed.

Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that \$25.00 be paid by the Treasurer to W. H. Kendall for 477 feet 3 inch plank furnished for Unionville bridge and culvert in road Div. No. 41, said sum payable on order of the mover.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Williams, moved that Mr. Kester be commissioner to superintend, on behalf of the municipality, the building of two culverts on the eastern towlaine, the municipality of Pickering having agreed to pay one-half the cost.

On motion the Council adjourned to meet on Saturday, 30th day of August. —Economiast.
