Markham Fall Exhibition.

A Successful Show. MARKHAM, Oct. 3. The 27th annual exhibition held by the Agricultural Societies of the East Riding of York and the township of Markham, was continued here on Friday.

There are now many manufacturers carried on in this village, so that the bulk of the exhibits in some classes is imported from various outside workshops.

Books have been heralded forth in the States with the high-sounding title of "Iron-clad." These books are what is technically termed "stabbed"—an old and exploded system, not only much cheaper, but far inferior to sewed ones.

Well bound books are stitched together with cord or string, and sewn together on tapes, giving that flexibility to the back which a book lies open.

There was a very fine show of wheeled vehicles, carriages, buggies, light and heavy waggon.

The exhibition of grain and seeds is not large, nor is it said that it is of a high quality.

The quality of the roots and vegetables, has been reported everywhere this season to be above that of the ordinary seasons past.

The Council met at the Council Chamber, Eglington, on Monday last, all the members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

Communications were received from G Smith re account of H Morrow; from F Shanly re sidewalk on Spadina road; from Wm Brown, asking to be appointed collector for 'e current year in Eastern Divisions Nos 4 and 5; from Mr William Tyrrell re F Shanly's communication and Thos Gilbert v John Carson; from James Muirhead re ditch on hill on side road between Lots 10 and 11, 3rd concession East York; from A F Miller, Secretary, Toronto General Hospital, in reference to York township patients; from R S Tyrrell, M D, re Richard Ezzard; from Frank Boston, in reference to the appointment of sidewalk commissioners at Norway.

Accounts were received from Messrs Winnifith Bros, for stationery; from C W Bunting, for advertising; from Messrs Moore Bros, for printing.

Estimates were received from the Township Engineer re Dennis Daniels, W Milne & Son, and Charles Robertson & Co.

A certificate was received from Isaac Doherty re John Mc Cartney.

Reports were received from the Treasurer, showing the amount of taxes levied in York township for 1879; from N Sheppard, showing the amount of non-residence, and non-collectable school taxes in East York for 1878.

Petitions, with subscription lists, were received asking for grants to assist in building sidewalks at Don and Danforth road, Brockton road, and Norway; also to improve road running through lot 7, 2nd concession from Bay, E Y; from John C Soider et al, asking for a grant to open a water course on Lot 22, 3rd concession W Y; from J M Anderson, James Young, Rodolphus Wilson, James E Hopkins, and James Brown, asking to be appointed collectors of rates for the year 1879; from John Burke et al, asking for a grant to repair sidewalks in the village of Eglington; from Thos Vaughan et al, asking for aid for B Cole.

Tenders were received for improving Foxwell's deviations.

The Clerk was instructed to advertise for the opening of a road deviation at lots 7 S, Humbler Range, also for the closing of original road allowance.

The Township Engineer was instructed to examine bridge on road running through lot 17, 2nd concession from Bay; also to survey road allowance at lots 36, 37, and 38, 3rd concession from Bay.

The Reeve was requested to make arrangements with the Toronto General Hospital for maintenance of patients.

The Council instructed Thos Gilbert to stay proceedings in suit Gilbert v Carson; the Council also examined into the claims of Frank Langrill for sheep killed by dogs.

By-laws were passed as follows:—

By-law No 598, appointing commissioners to open water course and improved road and bridge opposite lot 22, 3d concession, West York, and on Danforth road and Don and Danforth road; By-law No 599, instructing the Treasurer to pay the sum of \$1,215.00 for the improvement of public highways and other purposes; By-law No. 600, instructing the Treasurer to pay for charitable purposes the sum of \$120; By-law 601, appointing collectors for 1879; By-law No 602, accepting tenders for public works in the township of York; By-law No 603, amending By-law No 555.

The Council then adjourned.
