Mr. Resor moved, seconded by Mr. Forsler, that the Treasurer pay the account of Messrs Hart & Rawlinson, \$4.75 for stationary for the use of this municipality.

Mr. James moved, seconded by Mr. Williamson, that the Treasurer retain out of the funds of this municipality \$19.50, as provided for under Chap. 36, sec. 26...

Mr. Williamson, seconded by Mr. Forsler, moved that the sum of \$6 per month be granted to John Usher and wife, they being in destitute circumstances...

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Forsler, moved that the Reeve and Clerk be and is hereby appointed a committee to consolidate and revise the by-laws of this municipality...

Mr. Resor asked leave to introduce a by-law to appoint an assessor and auditors for this municipality for 1880 - Leave given.

On motion the by-law was read a first time and the blanks filled with the names of the following persons, assessor, Wm. Thomson, D. Strickler...

Mr. Forsler, seconded by Mr. James, moved that the Treasurer pay James J. Hunter, M. D. \$7.90 for lumber for railing on embankment at the River Bogus...

Mr. Resor, seconded by Mr. Williamson, moved that the account of James Reid, road overseer, division No 33 be paid by the Treasurer amounting in all to \$4.14...

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Resor, moved that when this Council adjourns it stands adjourned until Saturday, 21st of February.

Mr. Williamson, seconded by Mr. Resor, moved that the resolution granting \$1.50 for the maintenance of Wm Whiteook, payable to Mr. Cory, be and is hereby rescinded...
