Christianity and Science.

Much attention to the conflict or controversy between those who are endeavoring to maintain the supremacy and infallibility of the religion of Christ, and the believers or advocates of the Herbert Spencer school, is being attracted by the recent action of the authorities of Yale College. Prof. Sumner, of this college has adopted as a text book, "The Study of Sociology." A work which deals with the Christian religion as if it were merely a doctrine of men—a system devised and taught by our ancestors, for the purpose of governing and controlling mankind, or that portion of humanity which must believe in, and be controlled by something supernatural. Mr. Spencer, in this work, teaches that "when men have learned to divert their minds of childlike prejudices they will entertain a belief in an incomprehensible and infinitely remote Cause. The Christian religion is treated of exactly as the Mohammedan or any other religion or doctrine." The President and the majority of the members of the faculty of Yale College forbade the use of this text book, but Professor Sumner threatened to resign unless the objection was withdrawn, and he was therefore allowed to use it. No one can object to Prof. Sumner believing or reading what he pleases, but he should not be permitted to teach pupils opinions or doctrines antagonistic to the Christian religion.

The Council adjourned to meet in this Court Room, on Friday, the 28th May next, at 8 p.m.

Great Fire at Hull City.

On Wednesday, 21st inst, a fire originating from a spark from a burning chimney, destroyed the greater part of the City of Hull, near Ottawa. Buildings covering 40 acres were in the space of four hours reduced to ashes, and twelve persons are supposed to have perished in the flames. Since the great fire at St John's, this is the most destructive that has occurred in Canada. One thousand families and four thousand persons have been left homeless, homeless, and destitute by this extensive conflagration. The loss is estimated at \$700,000; the insurance on which amounts to less than one per cent. Hull was a wooden city, and its means for fire protection were very defective; hence so general a conflagration. Noble efforts are being made to aid the sufferers.

The Band is deserving of more encouragement than it has yet received; we do not seem to take such a deep interest in promoting and establishing such organizations, as they do in other villages, even where the Bands are of a very inferior order. The Missionary Meeting at Patterson on Thursday evening last was fairly attended. Mr Wm Patterson occupied the chair. Interesting addresses on Missionary work in Japan and other heathen countries, were given by the Revs. Messrs Sutherland and Cochran. The collection amounted to over \$58.

A very severe rain and wind storm sprang up suddenly on Monday afternoon last, and continued for about fifteen minutes. The lightning was sharp and frequent. Considerable damage was caused throughout the country. The only serious result of the storm in this neighborhood, is the barn destroyed by lightning, an account of which is given in another column.

DESTROYED BY LIGHTNING.—During the sudden storm on Monday last, the barn of Mr Silas Siver, 4th con Markham, about half-a-mile north of Buttonville, was struck by lightning and totally consumed, with all the contents, which consisted of a large quantity of seed grain and a few agricultural implements. The building was owned by Mr Calvert, who had an insurance of \$500 on it. There was not any insurance on the contents.

Moved by Mr Reaman, seconded by Mr Natress, that this Council offer a reward of \$20 for the apprehension and conviction of the party or parties who broke into the School House in section No. 19 and conducted themselves in a very improper manner. Carried.

Moved by Mr Card, seconded by Mr Reaman, that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to have printed notices put up on an intended By-law to be passed by this Council at next meeting, to be held at the Town Hall, on Tuesday, the 25th day of May next, for the purpose of closing up and disposing of the old road allowance, now not used on the east and south sides of the Congregational burying ground, in the village of Pine Grove, on the east to Levi Snider, and on the south to the Trustees of the Congregational Church and that he also have the same advertised according to law. Carried.

Moved by Mr Lahmer, seconded by Mr Natress, that the pathmaster of Road Beat No 26 be instructed to collect from said Beat the sum of \$20, and pay the same over to Mr Rumble and Mr Smith, the commissioners of the Village of Maple, for the purpose of meeting the expenses of making side-walks in the village of Maple, and paying the debt thereon. Carried.

Moved by Mr Card, seconded by Mr Natress, that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to notify Mr Thos Jackson to have his fence on the south side of the road allow the fence on the Town Line between York and Vaughan Townships, in the 2nd concession, removed from said road allowance on or before the 15th day of May next, and if said fence be not removed by that date, the committee appointed by this Council to look after the same are hereby instructed to take legal proceedings to have the same removed. Carried.

Moved by Mr Card, seconded by Mr Natress, that the commissioners for Dist. No. 1 be instructed to notify John McBride to fill that portion of ditch on Town Line on 2nd con., opposite lot No 1, into which he has run his underdrain for an outlet. Carried.

Moved by Mr Reaman, seconded by Mr Card, that the resolution passed at the February meeting granting the Clerk and Treasurer an additional fifty dollars to his salary be amended by striking out the following words "for the year 1880." Carried.

The Council then adjourned until Tuesday, the 25th day of May next, to meet at 10 a.m. at Court of Revision.

Robt De Coursier, the young man who shot his brother at Lambton Mills, last fall, an account of which was published in the HERALD, was tried in Toronto on Tuesday last before Justice Galt and a jury. He was found guilty of murder and sentenced to be hung on the 10th June next. The plea of insanity was made, but did not have any weight. The jury recommended him to mercy, on account of former good character, but the judge could hold out no hopes of commutation.

From A P Conger and 20 others, asking the Council to offer a reward of \$50 for the apprehension of the party or parties who committed a misdemeanor in the School House in S.S. No 19, between the 2nd and 5th con. The following communications were read: From the Treasurer of York in reference to a bridge built on the town line in the 5th concession. From the Clerk of the Township of King in reference to repairs done on the Town Line amounting to \$7.00. Moved by Mr Natress, seconded by Mr Card, that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the following sheep claims, it being two-thirds their value, to Mr J. J. Card, the sum of \$33, and to McKenzie and Rogerson \$8 63. Carried.
