

SUGAR REFINERS.

A meeting of the farmers of York Township was held at York Masonic Hall, Eglington, on Monday, 21st inst., to consider the propriety of establishing a sugar refinery in the township. The meeting was addressed by D Scheidtweiler, who gave an interesting account of the growth of About 30 years ago an Ojibaway Indian sugar beet root. &c., stating that where the boy named Sterner, from Lake Simcoe, soil is adapted for the purpose, from twentyfive to sixty tons of crop is grown to the acre. He thought there were sections of land in the township suitable for the purpose, and said he would require about sixty thousand tons of beet root per annum, if he established a refinery, and would probably keep from four to five hundred hands employed. He would like to purchase about two hundred acres of land, and would build about two hundred houses for his employees. The establishment, he thought, would cost three hundred thousand dollars. He asked the farmers to give the beet root a trial this season, and if it could be grown to ad- at present.
