OTTAWA, 25th MAY, 1881. WHEREAS circumstances have rendered it expedient to effect certain changes in the policy of he Government respecting the administration of Dominion Lands, PUBLIC NOTICE is here-

TIMBER FOR SETTLERS.

11. The system of wood lots in prairie townships shall be continued—that is to say, homested settbors having no timber on their own lands, shall be permitted to nurchase wood lots in area not exceeding 20 acres each, at a uniform rate of \$5 per acre, to be paid in cash.

12. The provision in the next preceding paragraphs shall apply also to settlers on prairie sections bought from the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, in cases where the only wood lands available have been laid out on even-numbered sections, provided the Railway Company agree to reciprocate where the only timber in the locality may be found on their lands.

13. With a view to encouraging settlement by chapening the cost of building materials, the Government reserves the right to grant licenses from time to time, under and in accordance with the provisions of the "Dominion Land Act," to tut meachantable timber ar any lends owned by it within surveyed townships; and settlement upon, or sale of any lands covered by such license, shall, for the time being, be sudject to the one-ration of the same.

SALES OF LANDS TO INDIVIDUALS OR CORPORATIONS FOR COLONIZATION.

14. In any case where a company or individual applies for leads to colonize and is willing to expend capital to contribute towards the construction of facilities for communication between such lands and existing settlements, and the Government is satisfied of the good faith and ability of such company or individual to carry out such undertaking, the odd-numbered section in the case of lands outside of the Canadian Facilities of the same, may be sold to such company or individual at half price, or at per acre, in cash. In case the land applied for bet situated within the Canadian Pacific Railway Belt, the same principle shall apply so far as one-half of each even-numbered section is concerned—that is to say, the one-half of each even-numbered section may be sold to the company or individual at the price \$1.25 per acre to be paid in cash.
