YORK COUNTY COUNCIL.

APPOINTMENT OF A WARDEN. At the inaugural meeting of the County Council held on Tuesday the following members were present—Messrs. Ashton, Abel, Brodie, Cannan, Cook, Duncan, Dolery, Davis, Dougherty, Eakin, Foster, Frankish, Gibb, Hamilton, Hamby, Henry Holborn, Hastings, Irwin, Jackson, Jones, James, Johnston, Lynch, Marritt, Morgan, Porter, Rower, Richardson, Reaman, Stoke Speight, Stevenson, Sprague, Seor, Thorn, Travis, Trench, Tyrrell, Williamson, Watson, Winchester, Webster, Wickson, and Walker.

The first business of the meeting was the election of a Warden for the ensuing year. Messrs. Rowen, Jones, and Jackson were nominated. The ballot was resorted to and showed twentyfour votes in favour of Mr. Rowen and 5 and 16 for the other two nominees respectively.

Mr. Rowen then took the chair, and addressed the Council in a few appropriate words thanking the members for reselecting him to the office.

A committee was appointed to strike the standing committees. The council went into committee of the whole, with Mr. Hamilton in the chair, to appoint auditors for the year. The by-law was read three times and passed. Messrs. A. J. Hughes and J. K. Leslie were appointed auditors at a salary of \$40 per annum.

The Warden appointed Mr. Hughs to the office, and the latter was appointed by vote. A meeting of all supporters of the Dominion Government will be held in Newmarket on Wednesday, 1st Feb. Dr. Strang M. P. and other prominent men are to be present and address the meeting.
