The plasters laborers have also split the difference, and accept \$1.45. five cents less than their demand. The painters accepted 181 cents per hour, instead of the 20 cents they asked for The most pleasing feature of the strikes is the quiet and orderly manner in which they were conducted. The men have been striking for four weeks, and druckeness, stealing or other crimes.
Across the lines and in European countries, strikes are attended by blodshed, thefis & incendiarism.
